### REPORT OF REGULAR SESSION MEETING OF THE AUBURN SCHOOL COMMITTEE

Auburn Hall October 3, 2018

### I. <u>Call To Order/Pledge Of Allegiance</u>

### A. Introductions

Mr. Kendall called the meeting to order at 7:38 PM. He led the pledge of allegiance and members introduced themselves noting the ward they represent.

### B. Communications

Ms. Gautier reported that the ShareCenter Director stated that there is a section called the Green Zone where the public can shop. She noted that the items are not specifically priced, but people can take them with a donation.

Ms. Fournier reported that a field hockey game was called off due to a shortage of bus drivers and the last ELHS football game was called off because too many players did not qualify.

Ms Grondin responded that transportation for after school activities is a problem because drivers are needed. She stated that we have reached out and posted notices on the City website, our website, and Facebook. She noted that we called several other groups to try to get other drivers for those events mentioned; however, others are also experiencing driver shortages. She stated that regarding the freshman football team, we had a bus ready to go and play under the lights, but some of the players had to play for the varsity games and that left too few players to play the game. She stated that everyone is working hard to try to eliminate the problem and work around it. She also reported that we are looking into the possibility of parents driving the minivan. Ms. Grondin explained the process for getting a bus driving license and encouraged members to reach out to others they may know to share the information.

It was <u>moved</u> by Ms. Hayes, <u>seconded</u> by Ms. Fournier and <u>voted</u> unanimously to approve the Consent Agenda for tonight's meeting including the addendum.

### III. Public Participation

Laura Garcia, Skillings Corner Rd. stated that the workshop was a direct result of the parents requesting a forum back in March when they could have an opportunity to be heard about the issues. She stated that the workshops are of very little value, if all stakeholders are not allowed to participate. She asked why the School Board is so afraid to allow the teachers and parents to discuss this issue. She noted that she has studied this and has questions, but now the teachers and other parents are gone and she cannot ask them questions. She asked why she was not allowed to ask

questions during the workshop. She asked how have the teachers been instructed to explain the 50-100 point scale for the students? She asked here is the playlist on Empower and how is it used? She noted that Sue Callahan explained some of that tonight, but there is more information needed. She noted that this is not just a tool used for a teacher to organize their thoughts. She wondered if the test scores over the past five years have shown improvement? She asked if we are on the right track? She asked if members could show that proficiency has improved test scores. She stated that the plan was to have consistency, but different content areas are taught differently, such as current events and math or english and science. She noted there is value in allowing teachers some latitude. She stated that sometimes consistency can be a bad thing too. She noted that she heard that students need to get a particular score to get credit. She stated that traditionally a student got credits and with enough credits they graduated; however, with proficiency based education, there are targets that students need to meet. She asked how many targets are there? She stated that the teachers are concerned about the amount of time they must spend to enter these targets. She stated that teachers are being dictated to about the targets and don't feel they have enough time to connect with the students. She reported that the task force met and she submitted a request for information and got very little information. She wondered why so much time was spent on the task force only to have their ideas dismissed. She stated that she very much liked what the Civic teacher said about teaching. She feels it is about teaching students confidence in their ability to learn and noted that the person who gives the student that confidence is the teacher. Ms. Garcia stated she feels that we are burdening teachers with tasks that don't necessarily make their teaching better. She stated that our retention rate is not good and wondered if we currently do exit interviews. Ms. Garcia stated that she would submit all of her questions in writing to ensure that she receives answers.

Barbara Howenic of Nottingham Rd stated that she was frustrated by the meeting tonight and wondered why the public cannot participate in a meeting that they requested. She stated that she felt there was no notice about the meeting. Ms. Howenic stated that she heard a 7th grade teacher has students who read at a 3rd grade level and that concerns her, noting that this is another flaw in our system because a student should not be in 7th grade and read at 3rd grade level. She noted that this is happening in all subjects and proficiency based learning doesn't seem to be catching these students.

### IV. Student Information

Ms. Fournier reported that the Leadership Council is planning an Alumni Tent for the upcoming football game at Walton Field and encouraged members to attend. She noted that the Council is also trying to get television monitors set up at the highschool to announce upcoming events. She stated that the entertainment committee is planning a study night with fun activities. She reported that this is Spirit Week at ELHS and seniors are in first place at the moment. She also reported that on Friday there will be a Kick it To Cancer event to raise money for Breast Cancer.

### V. Superintendent Report

- A. Planning and Development
  - 1. Enrollment Update

The Superintendent updated the members on current enrollment figures. She reported that the subsidy was based on an average of October and April enrollments; however, it is now based solely on the October enrollment. She noted that we do have a great deal of mobility and the elementary levels are slightly down. She explained that we expected this to happen at the kindergarten level because the pre kindergarten numbers were low last year; however, this year those numbers are higher. Ms. Grondin reviewed the numbers at the various schools and grades. She reminded members about the addition of teachers throughout the elementary levels this year to lower class sizes. She explained that even though we do add teachers, we need to understand that the facility needs to have the room to make another classroom and those options may need to be considered during budget deliberations. Ms. Grondin explained that pre kindergarten is not in any of the

numbers in the forms she handed out; however it is included in our subsidy. Ms. Grondin responded to questions from members and provided clarification.

### B. Business

1. Transfer of Funds

Mr. Hanson reported that the Finance Committee had reviewed the June 30, 2018 Year-End Financials and requested that transfers between Cost Centers be approved for the 2018 Fiscal Year operating budget as follows:

Ms. Fournier reported that she is very concerned about the Special Ed Department.

Ms. Grondin responded that on December 5, 2018 we will have a report from our Special Education Director who can address these issues. She noted that he is planning to bring in other programs and has various other ideas for return on investment.

Ms. Hayes asked about the buses.

Mr. Hanson responded that the buses are subsidized through state funding.

It was <u>moved</u> by Ms. Hayes, <u>seconded</u> by Ms. Gautier and <u>voted</u> unanimously to authorize the Superintendent of Schools and Business Manager pursuant to sections 2307 and 1485(4) of Title 20-A of the Maine Revised Statutes, as amended, to transfer amounts between cost centers approved for the 2018 fiscal year operating budget, provided that the total operating budget for that fiscal year shall not be increased by such transfers as presented.

2. Election of Delegate to the MSBA Annual Delegate Assembly

The members nominated and voted for a member of the School Committee to represent Auburn at the Maine School Board Association (MSBA) Delegate Assembly. Ms. Hayes volunteered to fill the position.

Ms. Grondin reported that she would forward information to Ms. Hayes to prepare for her seat as the delegate.

It was <u>moved</u> by Mr. Mennealy, <u>seconded</u> by Ms. Gautier and <u>voted</u> to approve the nomination of <u>Bonnie Hayes</u> to represent Auburn at the MSBA Annual Delegate Assembly.

To be awarded a high school diploma from the Auburn School Department, students graduating in the class of 2021 and beyond will be required to demonstrate achievement of all cross-curricular and content-area graduation standards. These graduation requirements will ensure that each learner provides evidence that they have achieved expected learning standards and acquired the knowledge, skills and work habits that will prepare them for postsecondary experiences. Our schools will provide the interventions, support systems and personalized-learning experiences that each learner needs to meet the expected standards and graduate ready to be successful in pursuing postsecondary pathways. Prior to 2021, students' graduation requirements will be phased in, increasing requirements each year as identified in the following sections.

### **Communicating Graduation Requirements**

To ensure that every learner and family has the information and resources they need to appropriately plan and sequence the learner's educational decisions, our schools, educators, and staff will communicate, prior to entering high school and throughout the learner's educational career, the graduation standards and diploma requirements that must be met to earn a high school diploma.

The Superintendent, through the high school principal and other designee, shall be responsible for ensuring that accurate, up-to-date information concerning all graduation standards and diploma requirements are (1) readily available to all incoming learners and their families in the spring preceding the start of each school year, and (2) published on the district and/or high school websites. A detailed guide to graduation standards, academic expectations, and diploma requirements will be disseminated to all incoming ninth-grade learners at the time of course selection. This policy will also be referenced in each edition of the high school learner handbook and on the district and/or high school websites.

As soon as practical and feasible, the School Committee expects the Superintendent or designee to inform all learners and their families of any modifications made to the district's graduation requirements, which extends to all applicable changes in relevant state law, rules or regulations.

The School Committee has approved the following schedule of minimum requirements for graduation, which encompasses minimum graduation requirements specified by the state and described in relevant laws, rules and regulations. The School Committee is aware that current law and regulations are subject to change. This policy represents an attempt to blend a credit-based system and a proficiency-based system until all graduating classes fall under the proficiency-based system.

### A. Diploma Requirements for Learners Graduating in the Class of 2018:

Individual Plan (I.P.)

An initial IP will be developed in Grade 8 by guidance counselors, teachers, parents, advisors, and students. The Individual Plan will be reviewed, updated, and approved annually.

### Core Areas (18 credits)\*

Core areas include all state and local standards. A credit is defined as a set of learning experiences that meet district standards (for example, classroom work, course work or approved alternative). Core area committees will define credit by aligning learning experiences with district standards. The asterisk (\*) denotes state requirements.

### Community Involvement

After securing pre-approval through a written proposal process, students will spend at least 24 hours involved in community service activities/events.

### Senior Capstone

- A. The Senior Capstone is a culminating experience in which students reflect on and present their high school learning.
- B. The Senior Capstone portfolio must include the following:

- 1. Evidence demonstrating proficiency in the Guiding Principles
- 2. Documentation of a minimum 24 hours of community service
- 3. Post-secondary plan
- 4. Evidence of learning relevant to post-secondary plan

### District and State Assessments

Students are required to take all assessments mandated by and in accordance with district guidelines and State statutes.

### Multiple Pathways

The Auburn School Department values all learning and provides access to a wide range of learning experiences, including but not limited to:

- · Academic courses offered by the school
- Dual enrollment or early college courses
- Career and technical education programming
- Online or blended learning options
- Alternative or at-risk programming
- Independent study
- Apprenticeships, internships, field work or exchange experiences
- Adult education

In addition, the Auburn School Department encourages its learners to explore learning options outside of the school building. To pursue independent, outside-of-school learning options, learners must have an approved Personal Learning Plan which describes the learning experience, including how it satisfies diploma requirements.

### **Student Status**

- A. To be considered full-time, a student must be enrolled in a minimum of six (6) learning experiences.
- B. For learners who transfer to Edward Little High School from another school, state or home-schooling situation, including educational programs that are not aligned with Auburn School Department's cross-curricular and content-area graduation standards, the Principal or designee shall evaluate the learner's prior educational experiences and determine to what degree the learner has met the high school graduation requirements. After enrolling in Edward Little High School, these learners shall satisfy all proficiency and graduation requirements as determined by the Principal or designee. The Superintendent shall determine whether these learners are eligible to receive a diploma.
- C. For previously home-schooled learners wishing to receive a diploma from Edward Little High School, the Principal/designee shall determine the value of the learner's prior educational experience toward meeting graduation requirements in accordance with Policy IHBGA. A home schooled learner must attend Edward Little High School must be enrolled as a full-time student at minimum for the year prior to graduation in order to receive an Edward Little High School diploma.

### Graduation Requirements for Learners Receiving Special Education Services

Learners who successfully meet Auburn School Department cross-curricular and content-area graduation requirements, as specified in the goals and objectives of their Individualized Education Programs (IEP) shall be awarded diplomas. The IEP team can identify accommodations and pathways for the learner with a disability, but the team cannot lower the proficiency standards for graduation requirements to receive a diploma. In accordance with 20-A MRSA 4722:

A. A student who is a child with a disability... may... become eligible for a diploma by demonstrating proficiency in state standards... through performance tasks and accommodations that maintain the integrity of the standards as specified in the student's individualized education program by the student's individualized education program team...

### Early Awarding of Diplomas

A learner who has met the graduation requirements in fewer than four years of high school may be awarded a diploma. Learners who wish to exercise this option must file their intention with the Edward Little High School Principal by October 15th of the school year in which they plan to graduate.

### **Delayed Awarding of Diplomas**

A learner who has satisfactorily completed the freshman year in an accredited degree-granting institution of higher education may receive a diploma provided Edward Little High School is the school last attended and the learner has notified the principal at the time of admission. A diploma may be awarded even though the learner does not meet all the Auburn School Department graduation requirements. Such decision shall be at the discretion of the Superintendent in accordance with the policies of the Auburn School Department School Committee.

### **Extended Study**

Learners are eligible for extended years of study to complete the graduation requirements if they have not reached the age of 20 as of July 1- of the enrolling year. Learners eligible for extended years of study may be referred to adult education or other programs and resources suitable to adult learners. Extended study for learners with disabilities shall be specified in a learner's IEP.

### **Certificate of Completion**

The School Committee may provide a certificate of completion to a learner who leaves school having completed four years attendance as a full-time high school student who has earned/completed the required credits/learning experiences but has not demonstrated proficiency in all Auburn School Department cross-curricular and content-area graduation requirements for the diploma.

### Participation in Graduation Ceremony

Learners must complete all requirements of graduation in order to participate in commencement exercises.

Students will select a cluster of learning experiences (for example, vocational experiences, the arts, business and office technologies) totaling at least six credits.

### Community Involvement

After securing pre-approval through a written proposal process, students will spend at least 24 hours involved in community events.

### Senior Exit Demonstration

- A. Senior Portfolio includes;
- 1. Individual Course Grid Sheet;
- 2. 24 Community Service Hours Documentation; and
- 3. A Written Reflection.
- B. Seniors will present their Senior Exit Demonstration to a Junior mentor group.

### District and State Assessments

Students are required to take all assessments mandated by and in accordance with district guidelines and State statutes.

### B. Diploma Requirements for Learners Graduating In The Class of 2021 and beyond:

### Educational Experiences

Learners must engage in educational experiences in English Language Arts; Mathematics; and Science and Technology in each year of high school.

### **Guiding Principles**

### Community Involvement

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- B. The Senior Capstone portfolio must include the following:
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Learners who successfully meet Auburn School Department cross-curricular and content-area graduation requirements, as specified in the goals and objectives of their Individualized Education Programs (IEP) shall be awarded diplomas. The IEP team can identify accommodations and pathways for the learner with a disability, but the team cannot lower the requirements to receive a diploma.

### Early Awarding of Diplomas

A learner who has met the graduation requirements in fewer than four years of high school may be awarded a diploma. Learners who wish to exercise this option must file their intention with the Edward Little High School Principal by October 15th of the school year in which they plan to graduate.

### **Delayed Awarding of Diplomas**

A learner who has satisfactorily completed the freshman year in an accredited degree-granting institution of higher education may receive a diploma provided Edward Little High School is the school last attended and the learner has notified the principal at the time of admission. A diploma may be awarded even though the learner does not meet all the Auburn School Department graduation requirements. Such decision shall be at the discretion of the Superintendent in accordance with the policies of the Auburn School Department School Committee.

### **Extended Study**

Learners are eligible for extended years of study to complete the graduation requirements if they have not reached the age of 20 as of July 1s of the enrolling year. Learners eligible for extended years of study

may be referred to adult education or other programs and resources suitable to adult learners. Extended study for learners with disabilities shall be specified in a learner's IEP.

### Participation in Graduation Ceremony

Learners must complete all requirements of graduation in order to participate in commencement exercises.
