VIII. Open Session - Members of the public are invited to speak to the Council about any issue directly related to City business which is *not on this agenda*.

IX. Adjournment

Executive Session: On occasion, the City Council discusses matters which are required or allowed by State law to be considered in executive session. Executive sessions are not open to the public. The matters that are discussed in executive session are required to be kept confidential until they become a matter of public discussion. In order to go into executive session, a Councilor must make a motion in public. The motion must be recorded, and 3/5 of the members of the Council must vote to go into executive session. An executive session is not required to be scheduled in advance as an agenda item, although when it is known at the time that the agenda is finalized, it will be listed on the agenda. The only topics which may be discussed in executive session are those that fall within one of the categories set forth in Title 1 M.R.S.A. Section 405(6). Those applicable to municipal government are:

A. Discussion or consideration of the employment, appointment, assignment, duties, promotion, demotion, compensation, evaluation, disciplining, resignation or dismissal of an individual or group of public officials, appointees or employees of the body or agency or the investigation or hearing of charges or complaints against a person or persons subject to the following conditions:

(1) An executive session may be held only if public discussion could be reasonably expected to cause damage to the individual's reputation or the individual's right to privacy would be violated;

(2) Any person charged or investigated must be permitted to be present at an executive session if that person so desires;

(3) Any person charged or investigated may request in writing that the investigation or hearing of charges or complaints against that person be conducted in open session. A request, if made to the agency, must be honored; and

(4) Any person bringing charges, complaints or allegations of misconduct against the individual under discussion must be permitted to be present.

This paragraph does not apply to discussion of a budget or budget proposal;

B. Discussion or consideration by a school board of suspension or expulsion of a public school student or a student at a private school, the cost of whose education is paid from public funds, as long as:

(1) The student and legal counsel and, if the student is a minor, the student's parents or legal guardians are permitted to be present at an executive session if the student, parents or guardians so desire;

C. Discussion or consideration of the condition, acquisition or the use of real or personal property permanently attached to real property or interests therein or disposition of publicly held property or economic development only if premature disclosures of the information would prejudice the competitive or bargaining position of the body or agency;

D. Discussion of labor contracts and proposals and meetings between a public agency and its negotiators. The parties must be named before the body or agency may go into executive session. Negotiations between the representatives of a public employer and public employees may be open to the public if both parties agree to conduct negotiations in open sessions;

E. Consultations between a body or agency and its attorney concerning the legal rights and duties of the body or agency, pending or contemplated litigation, settlement offers and matters where the duties of the public body's or agency's counsel to the attorney's client pursuant to the code of professional responsibility clearly conflict with this subchapter or where premature general public knowledge would clearly place the State, municipality or other public agency or person at a substantial disadvantage;

F. Discussions of information contained in records made, maintained or received by a body or agency when access by the general public to those records is prohibited by statute;

G. Discussion or approval of the content of examinations administered by a body or agency for licensing, permitting or employment purposes; consultation between a body or agency and any entity that provides examination services to that body or agency regarding the content of an examination; and review of examinations with the person examined; and

H. Consultations between municipal officers and a code enforcement officer representing the municipality pursuant to Title 30-A, section 4452, subsection 1, paragraph C in the prosecution of an enforcement matter pending in District Court when the consultation relates to that pending enforcement matter.



Subject: FEMA ASSISTANCE TO FIREFIGHTERS GRANT (AFG)

Information:

The Auburn Fire Department is requesting funding through FEMA and the Department of Homeland Security AFG Program

We are seeking grant funding to purchase an all wheel drive all terrain vehicle with wildland firefighting capabilities and with the additional capacity to be utilized to remove injured patients from difficult access areas. The basic specifications for the unit we are seeking are as follows:

- 4 or 6 wheel drive side by side two passengers all terrain vehicle with open rear platform. Unit to have enclosed cab for operations in all environments.
- Skid mount or bolt on wildland firefighting unit, consisting of water storage tank, Class A firefighting foam reservoir, fire pump with external power supply, hose reel (self rewinding) with ability to flow high pressure flows, Class A foam proportioner, hose and tool storage area, and capability to carry a stokes basket, or ambulance gurney. See attached images
- Track mounts for operation of the unit during winter months and on soft ground. These units are interchangeable with the tire units supplied on the ATV and can be changed out by staff.
- An aluminum flatbed tandem trailer with ramp for transporting the ATV to emergency sites.
- A ½ or ¾ ton 4 wheel drive pickup truck to haul this unit. This truck will also be used to haul the department's rescue boat, when the ATV is not needed. Would replace 1991 Ford F-150 with over 80,000 miles.

Advantages: Currently the AFD has no ability to access off road fire and or rescue incidents other than on foot. The addition of this ATV with wildland firefighting capability will greatly enhance our ability to fight fires in the Auburn Wildland/Urban interface as well as provide for the ability to more effectively treat and transport sick and injured patients from areas not accessible to traditional ambulances.

Subject: Maine Fire Service Institute (MFSI) 2016 Facilities Grant

Information:

MFSI has announced a fire training facilities grant for eligible fire departments to utilize in the maintenance and upkeep of existing training facilities. Auburn, along with Bangor, Caribou, Ellsworth, Hollis, Wiscasset and Yarmouth are eligible to apply for funds through this grant. The AFD training facility was built in 1989 and is a shared regional resource. It is in need of repair and modifications. The last time this grant was made available was in 2009.

Advantages:

Funds from this grant will allow for much needed repairs, modification and overhaul of much of the facility extending its life and value into the future for years to come.

Disadvantages: None

City Budgetary Impacts:

This grant provides for 100% reimbursement to the city for the approved amount of the award should we be successful in being awarded a grant. We anticipate approximately \$30,000.00 in expenditures would be needed to update the facility.



PROCLAMATION

CITY OF AUBURN DECLARES JANUARY 2016 AS HUMAN TRAFFICKING AWARENESS MONTH

WHEREAS, human trafficking is a form of modern day slavery that violates basic human rights and denies victims personal freedom; and

WHEREAS, human trafficking refers to the crime of recruiting, harboring, transporting, providing, or obtaining a person for compelled labor or commercial sexual exploitation through the use of force, fraud, or coercion including but not limited to involuntary servitude, sex trafficking, debt bondage, domestic servitude, forced child labor, and can, but does not necessarily, include the physical transportation of a victim from one location to another; and

WHEREAS, human trafficking is recognized as the fastest growing criminal enterprise in the world, with the International Labour Organization (ILO) estimating annual profits of \$150 billion USD from forced labor internationally; and

WHEREAS, the underground nature of the crime of human trafficking makes precise data collection difficult. However, of the 20.9 million victims the ILO estimated in 2012, 26% were children, and the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children estimated in 2014 that 1 out of every 6 endangered runaways reported to them were likely child sex trafficking victims; and

WHEREAS, human traffickers target impoverished and marginalized men, women, and children, with a disproportionate number of victims being women and girls; and

WHEREAS, victims of human trafficking suffer severe emotional, psychological, and physical abuse leading to complex PTSD, disassociation, increased rates of disease, drug addiction, and other lifelong effects of trauma; and

WHEREAS, human trafficking cases have been confirmed in our great City of Auburn, and many state, federal, and local agencies and organizations are working hard to prevent trafficking, intervene when trafficking is discovered, and provide restorative care to victims; and

WHEREAS, The City of Auburn recognizes human trafficking can not be ended by one agency or organization alone, but will take a *community wide* effort focused on primary prevention, intervention, education and awareness, protection of vulnerable populations, and the provision of trauma informed services for victims, through strong partnerships between local, state, and federal law enforcement agencies; the District Attorney's Office, and leaders in the nonprofit sector, in the business sector, in education, in social services, in health care, and in the faith community;

THEREFORE, I, Jonathan P. LaBonté, Mayor of the City of Auburn, with the support of members of the Auburn City Council, and the Auburn Police Department, do hereby declare January 2016 as Human Trafficking Awareness and Prevention Month. I call upon both citizens and leaders in our community, as well as our state and federal partners, to recognize the important role each of us can play in ending human trafficking and exploitation in all forms; and I encourage a community wide collaborative response to protect the vulnerable and care for the victimized.

Subject: Order-Authorizing Issuance of General Obligation Refunding Bonds

Information: A portion of the General Obligation bonds issued in 2006 are eligible to be refinanced. These bond proceeds were used for infrastructure work at the Industrial Park and infrastructure work done in the Mall area and the debt service is paid through TIF funds. The interest rate on the original bond issue was 3.98%.

Advantages: By doing the refunding issue the City will save approximately \$350,000 in interest payments over the next 10 years.

Disadvantages: The cost of issuance. (However this will be covered by the refinancing)

City Budgetary Impacts: Reduction in the debt service interest for the next 10 years.

Staff Recommended Action: Staff recommends passage.

TITLE: ORDER - AUTHORIZING ISSUANCE OF GENERAL OBLIGATION REFUNDING BONDS AND A TAX LEVY THEREFOR

WHEREAS: the City of Auburn has previously issued the following series of its general obligation bonds in furtherance of various municipal purposes (the "Prior Bonds"):

- \$13,000,000 2006 General Obligation Bonds dated November 1, 2006;

WHEREAS: due to the drop in available interest rates, the City desires to refund and refinance the \$4,405,000 callable portions of the Prior Bonds through issuance of its general obligation refunding bonds;

Now therefore, be It Ordered by the Auburn City Council, following a public hearing duly called and held as required by Article 8, Section 8.13 of the Auburn City Charter:

THAT there be and hereby is authorized the issuance and sale of the City's general obligation bonds in the amount of \$4,405,000, the proceeds of which, including premium, if any, and investment earnings thereon, are hereby appropriated for the following purpose (including costs of issuance, redemption premium interest to the redemption date, and any other costs related or ancillary thereto):

Amount	Category
\$4,405,000	Advance Refund the Prior Bonds described above

THAT the bonds shall be issued as authorized hereunder and shall be signed by the City's Finance Director and its Treasurer, attested by the City Clerk under the seal of the City. A tax levy is hereby provided for each fiscal year that the bonds authorized hereunder remain outstanding to meet the annual installments of principal and interest as may accrue in each respective year. The bonds may be issued at one time or from time to time, either singly or in series, and the authority and discretion to fix method of sale, issue date, maturities, denominations, interest rate, place of payment, form and other details of said bonds and notes, and to take all other actions and to sign and deliver all other documents, certificates and agreements in order to provide for the sale thereof is hereby delegated to the City's Finance Director.

THAT the bonds authorized hereunder may be made subject to call for redemption, either with or without premium, on such terms as may be determined by the Finance Director.

THAT the authority and discretion to designate the bond or notes, or a portion thereof, as qualified tax-exempt obligations under Section 265 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, is hereby delegated to the Finance Director.

THAT the City's Finance Director, Treasurer, Clerk, and other proper officials of the City be, and hereby are, authorized and empowered in its name and on its behalf to do or cause to be done all such acts and things, and to execute, deliver, file, approve, and record all such financing documents, refunding escrow agreements, contracts, agreements, certificates, and other documents as may be necessary or advisable, with the advice of counsel for the City, to carry out the provisions of the resolutions heretofore adopted at this meeting in connection with the refunding of the Prior Bonds, as may be necessary or desirable.

Subject: Maine Fire Service Institute (MFSI) 2016 Facilities Grant

Information:

MFSI has announced a fire training facilities grant for eligible fire departments to utilize in the maintenance and upkeep of existing training facilities. Auburn, along with Bangor, Caribou, Ellsworth, Hollis, Wiscasset and Yarmouth are eligible to apply for funds through this grant. Subject: FEMA ASSISTANCE TO FIREFIGHTERS GRANT (AFG)

Information:

The Auburn Fire Department is requesting funding through FEMA and the Department of Homeland Security AFG Program

We are seeking grant funding to purchase an all wheel drive all terrain vehicle with wildland firefighting capabilities and with the additional capacity to be utilized to remove injured patients from difficult access areas. The basic specifications for the unit we are seeking are as follows:

- 4 or 6 wheel drive side by side two passengers all terrain vehicle with open rear platform. Unit to have enclosed cab for operations in all environments.
- Skid mount or bolt on wildland firefighting unit, consisting of water storage tank, Class A firefighting foam reservoir, fire pump with external power supply, hose reel (self rewinding) with ability to flow high pressure flows, Class A foam proportioner, hose and tool storage area, and capability to carry a stokes basket, or ambulance gurney. See attached images
- Track mounts for operation of the unit during winter months and on soft ground. These units are interchangeable with the tire units supplied on the ATV and can be changed out by staff.
- An aluminum flatbed tandem trailer with ramp for transporting the ATV to emergency sites.
- A ½ or ¾ ton 4 wheel drive pickup truck to haul this unit. This truck will also be used to haul the department's rescue boat, when the ATV is not needed. Would replace 1991 Ford F-150 with over 80,000 miles.

Advantages: Currently the AFD has no ability to access off road fire and or rescue incidents other than on foot. The addition of this ATV with wildland firefighting capability will greatly enhance our ability to fight fires in the Auburn Wildland/Urban interface as well as provide for the ability to more effectively treat and transport sick and injured patients from areas not accessible to traditional ambulances.

Subject: Proposed ordinance amendment to Sec. 2-58 Time and place of regular meetings

Information: Under our current ordinance, if a regular meeting night falls on a legal holiday or the night before a legal holiday, then the stated meeting shall be held on the following Tuesday. There has been discussion about amending the ordinance so those meetings are held on the following Monday instead.

Sec. 2-58. - Time and place of regular meetings.

The dates and time of the regular meetings of the city council shall be the first and third Mondays of each calendar month at 7:00 p.m. If a regular meeting night falls on a legal holiday or the night before a legal holiday, then the stated meeting shall be held on the following Tuesday at the same time and place unless the city council shall, at the meeting held next prior to the meeting falling on the holiday or the night before the holiday, fix a different alternate meeting date. The place of such meetings shall be the city council chamber in the city building, hereby designated to be the regular meeting place, unless the council designates another meeting place. All meetings of the city council shall be open to the public, and may be continued to another location. (Code 1967, § 1-3.7; Ord. of 1-12-1998)

No ordinance, order for the issue of bonds or notes, or appropriation resolve shall be passed until it has been read on two separate days, except when the requirement of a reading on two separate days has been dispensed by unanimous vote of the councilors present and voting. Every ordinance shall be published in full within five days after its final passage, by posting a copy of the same at the city clerk's office, as well as electronically on the city's website, if available, and shall take effect and be in force five days after the date of passage unless otherwise specifically provided in the ordinance.

Except as otherwise required by this Charter, **action by the city council shall require at least four affirmative votes. Five affirmative votes shall be required to adopt ordinances to take effect immediately upon enactment.**

Advantages: Consistency – regularly scheduled meetings will always fall on a Monday unless Council votes to move to another night as outlined in the ordinance.

Disadvantages: With the quick turnaround time between meetings, it may be challenging for staff to set the agenda, provide the necessary documents, complete minutes, and post the agenda packet for the following meeting (within 3 days of the previous meeting).

Staff Recommended Action: Consider the proposed ordinance amendment.

Sec. 2.6. - Process.

- A. Record. The city council shall keep a record of its own proceedings which, except for "executive sessions," shall be available to the public.
- B. Qualification. The city council shall be judge of the qualification and election of its members and shall determine and enforce this Charter as well as its rules relating to procedure, misconduct, and forfeiture of office.
- C. Action. The city council shall act only by oral motion or written ordinance, order, or resolve, except that all acts by which the city council appropriates or expends funds shall be by written ordinance, order, or resolve. All ordinances, orders, and resolves, except resolves making appropriations, shall be confined to one subject clearly expressed in its title. Appropriation resolves shall be confined to the subject of appropriations. No ordinance, order for the issue of bonds or notes, or appropriation resolve shall be passed until it has been read on two separate days, except when the requirement of a reading on two separate days has been dispensed by unanimous vote of the councilors present and voting. Every ordinance shall be published in full within five days after its final passage, by posting a copy of the same at the city clerk's office, as well as electronically on the city's website, if available, and shall take effect and be in force five days after the date of passage unless otherwise specifically provided in the ordinance.
- D. Voting. A roll call vote shall be taken upon both first and second reading of all ordinances and entered on the record of the proceedings of the city council by the city clerk. An ordinance may be read by title only if, in the judgment of the mayor, or in the mayor's absence the presiding officer, it would be unduly burdensome or repetitive to read the full text. A roll call vote shall be taken on the passage of any order or resolve when requested by any councilor. Except as otherwise required by this Charter, action by the city council shall require at least four affirmative votes. Five affirmative votes shall be required to adopt ordinances to take effect immediately upon enactment.

Be it ordained by the Auburn City Council, that Part II, Code of Ordinance, Chapter 2, Administration, Article Article II, Mayor and City Council, Division 2, Rules of Procedure, Section 2-58, Time and place of regular meetings be amended as follows:

Sec. 2-58. - Time and place of regular meetings.

The dates and time of the regular meetings of the city council shall be the first and third Mondays of each calendar month at 7:00 p.m. If a regular meeting night falls on a legal holiday or the night before a legal holiday, then the stated meeting shall be held on the following ~~Tuesday~~ Monday at the same time and place unless the city council shall, at the meeting held next prior to the meeting falling on the holiday or the night before the holiday, fix a different alternate meeting date. The place of such meetings shall be the city council chamber in the city building, hereby designated to be the regular meeting place, unless the council designates another meeting place. All meetings of the city council shall be open to the public, and may be continued to another location.
