ADJOURNMENT

Executives Sessions: On occasion, the City Council discusses matters which are required or allowed by State law to be considered in executive session. Executive sessions are not open to the public. The matters that are discussed in executive session are required to be kept confidential until they become a matter of public discussion. In order to go into executive session, a Councilor must make a motion in public. The motion must be recorded, and 3/5 of the members of the Council must vote to go into executive session. An executive session is not required to be scheduled in advance as an agenda item, although when it is known at the time that the agenda is finalized, it will be listed on the agenda.

The only topics which may be discussed in executive session are those that fall within one of the categories set forth in Title 1 M.R.S.A. Section 405. Those applicable to municipal government are:

- 1. Discussion of personnel issues
- 2. Discussion or consideration of the condition, acquisition, or the use of real or personal property or economic development if premature disclosure of the information would prejudice the competitive or bargaining position of the body or agency.
- 3. Discussion of labor contracts and proposals and meetings between a public agency and its negotiators.
- 4. Consultations between a body or agency and its attorney
- 5. Discussion of information contained in records made, maintained or received by a body or agency when access by the general public to those records is prohibited by statute.
- 6. Discussion or approval of the content of examinations administered by a body or agency for licensing, permitting or employment purposes
- 7. Consultations between municipal officers and a code enforcement officer relating to enforcement matter pending in District Court.

PRESENT

Mayor Jenkins called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. in the Council Chambers of Auburn Hall with a salute to the flag.

GENERAL ASSISTANCE QUARTERLY REPORT

ORDINANCE – CHAPTER 21, ARTICL 2 – FIRE DEPARTMENT SERVICE CHARGES

INFORMATION:

Attached is an ordinance that is prepared and presented by the Fire Department to charge fees for certain services, such as salvage calls, false alarms, demolition burns, vehicles accidents, fire investigations, etc. The purpose of this ordinance is to provide an equitable way to provide these services.

TITLE : ORDINANCE – CHAPTER 21, ARTICLE 2 – FIRE DEPARTMENT SERVICE CHARGES

Be It **Ordained** by the Auburn City Council, That Chapter 21 of the Auburn Ordinances be amended by adding Article 2:

Article 2, Section 2.1 – Fire Department Services Charges

Effective ______ the Fire Department will charge for the following services. The fees for these services will be listed in Appendix A of this Chapter.

<u>Salvage Calls</u> - Those calls that require the Department to actively remove or mitigate those instances that could be harmful such as removal of water, smoke, odor, etc., not caused by department functions.

<u>Stand-by at Fireworks</u> – One firefighter at all fireworks (not sponsored by the municipality) displays from one half hour before the show to one half hour after the show.

<u>False Alarm</u> - A visual and/or audible signal including an automatic telephone dialing alarm transmitted by an alarm system, which indicates the existence of an emergency situation, when in fact, no such emergency exists. It shall include any activation of an alarm system by whatever means, but would not include alarms resulting from any of the following causes: (1) severe weather conditions such as high winds, lightning, rain, freezing rain, snow or flooding; (2) electrical service interruptions; (3) broken city water main. A fire alarm user, however, will be charged a service charge for false alarms resulting from any of the following causes: (1) testing, repairing, alteration or addition to the fire protection or detection system without prior notification; (2) faulty equipment or substandard installation of equipment; (3) lack of maintenance to fire protection or detection system; (4) negligence that constitutes a public nuisance or jeopardizes the public welfare or safety. Provisions must also be made to protect alarm systems from activating during construction. Service charges will activate on the second time a false alarm is received and will escalate with each subsequent response to a false alarm as outlined in the charges appendix in this chapter.

<u>Vehicle Accidents/Hazardous Materials Incidents</u> - Providing command and control, scene safety, extrications, fire suppression, hazard mitigation, etc., at vehicle accidents.

<u>Hazardous Materials Incident</u> - A hazard that poses a potential threat to life, health, environment or property. It may require limited or large scale evacuation of nearby residents or facilities; involvement of two or more jurisdictions; and/or the Fire

Department to supply water, breathing air, air monitoring, ventilation, and medical monitoring, as well as operational level mitigation such as diking, diverting or denying entry.

<u>Demolition Burn</u> - The burning of structure in lieu of raising it and transporting building materials to a solid waste facility. Requests will be processed, when the Fire Chief or his designee determines that it is safe to do so and has documentation of having met all of the DEP compliance requirements.

<u>Oil/Propane/Gas Burner Permit</u> – Any new or replacement burner requires a permit for installation.

<u>Out of Control Burns</u> – Persons allowing open burning to get out of control, requiring the response of the Fire Department, shall be charged a fee as listed in this chapter.

<u>Illegal or Unauthorized Burning</u> – Any type of burning that is identified as illegal or unauthorized will be charged a fee as listed in this chapter.

<u>Fire Investigations</u> requiring one hour or more of staff time will be billed per hour in accordance with the fees as listed in this chapter.

<u>Code Inspection Citations</u> - Fees assessed for subsequent code violation inspections that indicate violations continue to exist will be charged a fee as listed in this chapter.

The Fire Chief shall have the authority to waive any of the above fees/charges for services.

APPENDIX A – FIRE DEPARMENT FEE SCHEDULE

*Demolition Burns - \$2,500

*False Alarms – Initial charge of \$100 escalating \$100 for each subsequent alarm received in a calendar year.

*Fire Investigations For Arson - \$100/hr

*Hazardous Materials Incident - \$200 first hour and \$400/hr beyond the first hour for required services

*Illegal/Unauthorized Burning - \$200/hr

*Life Safety Code Inspection Citations - \$50 per code violation (fee doubled for each subsequent inspection that identifies code violations still exist)

*Oil/Propane/Gas Burner Permits - \$30/permit – An additional \$30 charge for each additional inspection that has to be made for completion of compliance if not satisfied on the first inspection

*Out of Control Burns - \$200/hr

*Salvage Calls – Residential salvage calls will be billed at \$150/hr. and \$50 a day per loaned sump pump. Commercial buildings will be billed at \$500/hr or any portion thereof.

*Stand-by at Fireworks - \$200/hr

* Vehicle accidents - \$200/hr
