- 3. Discussion of labor contracts and proposals and meetings between a public agency and its negotiators.
- 4. Consultations between a body or agency and its attorney
- 5. Discussion of information contained in records made, maintained or received by a body or agency when access by the general public to those records is prohibited by statute.
- 6. Discussion or approval of the content of examinations administered by a body or agency for licensing, permitting or employment purposes
- 7. Consultations between municipal officers and a code enforcement officer relating to enforcement matter pending in District Court.

Whereas, trees, wherever they are planted, are a source of joy and spiritual renewal.

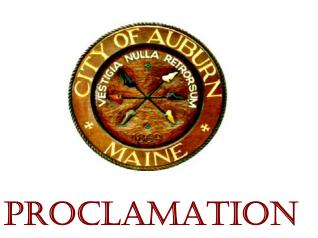

AMYOTROPHIC LATERAL SCLEROSIS AWARENESS MONTH

This measure would proclaim the month of May 2008 as Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis (ALS) Awareness Month.

WHEREAS, Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis or ALS is better known as Lou Gehrig's disease; and

WHEREAS, ALS is a fatal neurodegenerative disease characterized by degeneration of cell bodies of the lower motor neurons in the gray matter of the anterior horns of the spinal cord; and

WHEREAS, The initial symptom of ALS is weakness of the skeletal muscles, especially those of the extremities; and

WHEREAS, As ALS progresses the patient experiences difficulty in swallowing, talking, and breathing; and

WHEREAS, ALS eventually causes muscles to atrophy and the patient becomes a functional quadriplegic; and

WHEREAS, ALS does not affect a patient's mental capacity, so that the patient remains alert and aware of his or her loss of motor functions and the inevitable outcome of continued deterioration and death; and

WHEREAS, On average, patients diagnosed with ALS only survive two to five years from the time of diagnosis; and

WHEREAS, research indicates that military veterans are at a 50% or greater risk of developing ALS than those who have not served in the military; and

WHEREAS, ALS has no known cause, means of prevention, or cure; and

WHEREAS, Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis Awareness Month increases the public's awareness of ALS patients' circumstances and acknowledges the terrible impact this disease has not only on the patient but on his or her family and the community and recognizes the research being done to eradicate this horrible disease;

NOW THEREFORE, be it resolved by the Mayor and City Council of Auburn, that the Mayor and City Council hereby proclaims the month of May 2008 as Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis Awareness Month in Auburn, Maine.

FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT REPORT FOR APRIL 2008

Honorable Mayor Jenkins and Members of the City Council

Attached please find the financial report for the month of April 2008. As of April 30th, the City has completed ten months of the fiscal year. The City's major revenue sources – personal property taxes were due on August 27th. The first half of the real estate taxes were due on September 17th, and the second half were due on March 17th. As a guideline for tracking purposes, revenues and expenditures should amount to approximately 83.3% of the annual budget. However, not all costs and revenues are distributed evenly throughout the year; individual line items can vary based upon cyclical activity.

Revenues

Revenues collected through April 30th were \$59,947,317, or 92.34%, of the budget. The accounts listed below are noteworthy.

- A. Personal Property Taxes have traditionally been due by July 15. This year, however, due to the additional time needed to complete the property assessments and the Tax Commitment, personal property taxes were due on August 27th. The second half of the taxes were due on March 17. We have collected 93.52% of the budgeted amount.
- B. Homestead Exemption has been fully received.
- C. Penalties & Interest are above anticipation.
- D. *Intergovernmental City of Lewiston* reflects the receipt of the tax sharing from the City of Lewiston.
- E. Parking Tickets & Fines are up due to aggressive accounts receivable.
- F. *Investment Income* is above anticipated expectations.
- G. *Rental Income* is higher due to the annual payment from Maine Intermodal Transportation, Inc. for the lease at the intermodal facility.

H. Sale of Recyclables is above anticipation due to the increase in commodity pricing.

Expenditures

Expenditures through April 30th were \$52,237,736, or 80.46%, of the budget. Noteworthy variances are:

- A. Mayor and Council: Full payments for AVCOG dues and the annual audit have been made.
- B. *Information Systems*: Hardware failure in the wide-area network in both Lewiston and Auburn, resulted in unanticipated expenditures. The City pays its annual software maintenance agreements in the first quarter of each fiscal year.
- C. Community Programs: Full payment of the appropriation for the Liberty Festival was made in July.
- D. *Debt Service*: The first half of the debt service payments have been expended which included principal and interest, as well as the majority of the second half of the interest payments.
- E. *Property:* All of the City's insurance premiums have been paid for the fiscal year.
- F. Workers Compensation: The annual workers compensation transfer was made for both the City and School departments in October.
- G. *Intergovernmental Programs*: The City funds these agencies quarterly upon receipt of their invoices. The County Tax payment was due September 1 and paid in full on Friday, August 31st.

<u>Investments</u>

This section contains an investment schedule as of April 30th, as well as a comparison of the investments between April 30th and the prior month. Currently the City's funds are earning an average interest rate of 2.14%, compared to approximately 5.06% last year at this time.

Be It Resolved by the Auburn City Council, that the following be, and hereby is the Annual Appropriation Resolve of the City of Auburn for the fiscal year 2008-2009, which includes the amounts appropriated herein and revenues from all sources beginning July 1, 2008 and ending June 30, 2009, in the aggregate amount of \$66,218,673, with a municipal budget of \$32,011,833 and a School Department budget of \$34,206,840, based upon the budget submitted to the Auburn City Council on March 17, 2008, by the City Manager, and notification was published in the Lewiston Sun Journal, a daily newspaper in the County of Androscoggin on March 24, 2008, that a public hearing would be held on April 7, 2008, at 7:00 p.m. and said hearing having been held on that date, and as amended by the City Council, the same is hereby appropriated for the fiscal year 2008-2009 beginning July 1, 2008 for the lawful expenditures of the City of Auburn and for the County of Androscoggin taxes, and said amounts are declared not to be in excess of the estimated revenue from taxation and sources other than taxation for the fiscal year of 2008-2009.

SCHOOL BUDGET ARTICLES

- 1. That \$13,394,375.00 be authorized to be expended for Regular Instruction;
- 2. That \$6,861,845.00 be authorized to be expended for Special Education;
- 3. That \$-0- be authorized to be expended for Career and Technical Education;
- 4. That \$596,813.00 be authorized to be expended for Other Instruction;
- 5. That \$3,649,504.00 be authorized to be expended for Student and Staff Support;
- 6. That \$717,509.00 be authorized to be expended for System Administration;
- 7. That \$1,266,769.00 be authorized to be expended for School Administration;
- 8. That \$1,279,023.00 be authorized to be expended for Transportation and Buses;
- 9. That \$3,201,056.00 be authorized to be expended for Facilities Maintenance;
- 10. That \$2,817,725.00 be authorized to be expended for Debt Service and Other Commitments:
- 11. That \$422,221.00 be authorized to be expended for All Other Expenditures;
- 12. That \$30,450,650.00 be appropriated for the total cost of funding public education from kindergarten to grade 12 as described in the Essential Programs and Services Funding Act and that \$12,590,410.00 be raised as the municipality's contribution to the total cost of funding public education from kindergarten to grade 12 as described in the Essential Programs and Services

Funding Act in accordance with the Maine Revised Statues, Title 20-A, section 15688;

Explanation: The city's contribution to the total cost of funding public education from kindergarten to grade 12 as described in the Essential Programs and Services Funding Act is the amount of money determined by state law to be the minimum amount that a municipality must raise in order to receive the full amount of state dollars.

13. That \$1,469,958.00 be raised and appropriated for the annual payments on debt service previously approved by the city's legislative body for non-state-funded school construction projects, non-state-funded portions of school construction projects and minor capital projects in addition to the funds appropriated as the local share of the city's contribution to the total cost of funding public education from kindergarten to grade 12;

Explanation: Non-state-funded debt service is the amount of money needed for the annual payments on the city's long-term debt for major capital school construction projects and minor capital renovation projects that are not approved for state subsidy. The bonding of this long-term debt was previously approved by the voters or other legislative body.

14. That \$684,889.00 be raised and appropriated in additional local funds for school purposes under the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 20-A, section 15690;

Explanation: The additional local funds are those locally raised funds over and above the municipality's local contributions to the total cost of funding public education from kindergarten to grade 12 as described in the Essential Programs and Services Funding Act and local amounts raised for the annual payment on non-statefunded debt service that will help achieve the school department budget for education programs.

15. That the school committee be authorized to expend \$33,754,810.00 for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2008 and ending June 30, 2009 from the city's contribution to the total cost of funding public education from kindergarten to grade 12 as described in the Essential Programs and Services Funding Act, non-state-funded school construction projects, additional local funds for school purposes under the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 20-A, section 15690, unexpended balances, tuition receipts, state subsidy and other receipts for the support of schools;

A tax levy is hereby provided for each fiscal year that the bonds authorized hereunder remain outstanding to meet the annual installments of principal and interest as may accrue in each respective year. The bonds may be issued at one time or from time to time, either singly or in series, and the authority and discretion to fix the issue date, maturities, denominations, interest rate,

place of payment, form and other details of said bonds and notes, and to take all other actions and to sign and deliver all other documents, certificates and agreements in order to provide for the sale thereof is hereby delegated to the Finance Director and City Treasurer.

THAT the bonds authorized hereunder may be made subject to call for redemption, either with or without premium, on such terms as may be determined by the Finance Director.

THAT in order to finance temporarily the projects described above, the Finance Director is authorized to expend up to \$6,700,000 either from available funds of the City or from the proceeds of Bond Anticipation Notes (BAN's) which would be reimbursed or refinanced from bond proceeds.

THAT the authority and discretion to designate the bond or notes, or a portion thereof, as qualified tax-exempt obligations under Section 265 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, is hereby delegated to the Finance Director.

THAT this order is a declaration of official intent pursuant to Treas. Reg. § 1.150-2 and shall be kept available for public inspection during reasonable business hours at the office of the City Clerk.

ORDER – AUTHORIZING THE FY 2008-2009 TAX COMMITMENT
<u>INFORMATION</u> :
During the budget process, the City Council approves the amount of expenditures necessary to fund the approved budget. The budget is funded from several sources including State aid such as aid for education, Revenue Sharing, and Local Road assistance, and fees including building and development fees. The largest source or revenue for municipalities in Maine is the property tax. The City Council must authorize the amount of property taxes that need to be collected (tax Commitment) to fund the approved budget.
Based on the approved budget expenditure level, the amount of property taxes needed to be collected in FY 2009 is: \$37,917,808. Once the City Council votes to set the tax commitment, the tax bills will be sent. The first half of the property tax payment will be due September 15, 2008; the second payment will be due March 16, 2009. Personal Property taxes will be due August 18, 2008. The State Treasurer has established the interest rate that can be charged on late tax payments at 11%.

Be It Ordered by the Auburn City Council, That the Assessor of Taxes of the City of Auburn is directed to assess a tax upon all real estate in Auburn liable to be taxed therein; and to assess the owners of personal property liable to be taxed therein on the first day of April, 2008 and not exempt from taxation, to the aggregate amount of \$37,917,808 in accordance with provisions of the statutes of Maine in such cases made and provided; make perfect lists under her hand of such assessments and commit the same to the Collector of Taxes for the City of Auburn, on or before the seventh day of July, 2008. Fifty percent (50%) of all real estate taxes assessed as above and committed to the collector, shall be due proportionately from each taxpayer on September 15, 2008 and the remaining fifty percent (50%) shall be due on March 16, 2009. Except as may be provided by resolve regarding payments in accordance with an installment payment plan, any taxes remaining uncollected on September 15, 2008 and March 16, 2009 respectively, shall bear interest at a rate of 11% per annum from and after such dates. Personal property taxes shall be due and payable on or before August 18, 2008. Any personal taxes remaining unpaid after August 25, 2008 shall bear an interest rate of 11% per annum from and after such date. Interest on all delinquent taxes shall be computed on a daily basis and shall be collected by the Tax Collector. The Tax Collector is authorized to accept tax prepayments.
