

Executive Session: On occasion, the City Council discusses matters which are required or allowed by State law to be considered in executive session. Executive sessions are not open to the public. The matters that are discussed in executive session are required to be kept confidential until they become a matter of public discussion. In order to go into executive session, a Councilor must make a motion in public. The motion must be recorded, and 3/5 of the members of the Council must vote to go into executive session. An executive session is not required to be scheduled in advance as an agenda item, although when it is known at the time that the agenda is finalized, it will be listed on the agenda. The only topics which may be discussed in executive session are those that fall within one of the categories set forth in Title 1 M.R.S.A. Section 405. Those applicable to municipal government are:

- A. Discussion of personnel issues
- B. Discussion or consideration by a school board of suspension of expulsion
- C. Labor contracts
- D. Contemplated litigation
 E. Discussions of information contained in records made, maintained or received by a body or agency when access by the general public to those records is prohibited by statute;
- F. Discussion or approval of the content of examinations administered by a body or agency for licensing, permitting or employment purposes; consultation between a body or agency and any entity that provides examination services to that body or agency regarding the content of an examination; and review of examinations with the person examined; and
- G. Consultations between municipal officers and a code enforcement officer representing the municipality pursuant to Title 30-A, section 4452, subsection 1, paragraph in the prosecution of an enforcement matter pending in District Court when the consultation relates to that pending enforcement matter.

Attached please find the financial report for the month of November 2009. As a guideline for tracking purposes, revenues and expenditures should amount to approximately 42% of the annual budget. However, not all costs and revenues are distributed evenly throughout the year; individual line items can vary based upon cyclical activity.

<u>Revenues</u>

Revenues collected through November 30th were \$33,417,241, or 48.74%, of the budget. The accounts listed below are noteworthy.

- A. Excise tax collected for the month of November is \$181,006. Excise tax collected through November is at 40.85%. This is a \$77,910 decrease from last October and a \$183,152 decrease from fiscal year 2007.
- B. State Revenue Sharing for the month of November is \$240,705 which is 2.6% less than November 2008. The total percent of budget is 3.08% less than last fiscal year at the end of November.
- C. Penalties & Interest are above anticipation due to collection prior year's real estate and personal property taxes in the month of November \$20,485 was collected.
- D. Rents are above due to a new tenant and renting out the auditorium and gym.

Expenditures

Expenditures through November 30th were \$30,076,112 or 45.93%, of the budget. Noteworthy variances are:

- A. Mayor and Council: In the month of November the plaques, frames and gavel was purchased for the departing Mayor and councilors.
- B. Property: The automatic controller for the heating pump in City Hall was replaced on November 16th.

Investments

This section contains an investment schedule as of November 30th, as well as a comparison of the investments between November 30th and the prior month. Currently the City's funds are earning an average interest rate of .36%, compared to approximately .60% last year at this time.
