In order to go into executive session, a Councilor must make a motion in public. The motion must be recorded, and 3/5 of the members of the Council must vote to go into executive session. An executive session is not required to be scheduled in advance as an agenda item, although when it is known at the time that the agenda is finalized, it will be listed on the agenda. The only topics which may be discussed in executive session are those that fall within one of the categories set forth in Title 1 M.R.S.A. Section 405. Those applicable to municipal government are:

- 1. Discussion of personnel issues
- 2. Discussion or consideration of the condition, acquisition, or the use of real or personal property or economic development if premature disclosure of the information would prejudice the competitive or bargaining position of the body or agency.
- 3. Discussion of labor contracts and proposals and meetings between a public agency and its negotiators.
- 4. Consultations between a body or agency and its attorney
- 5. Discussion of information contained in records made, maintained or received by a body or agency when access by the general public to those records is prohibited by statute.
- 6. Discussion or approval of the content of examinations administered by a body or agency for licensing, permitting or employment purposes
- 7. Consultations between municipal officers and a code enforcement officer relating to enforcement matter pending in District Court.

To the members of the Auburn city council,

I am writing this letter in regards to the sale of property at 133 Hampshire street. I have a few concerns regarding the sale of said property to the Habitat Community and the building of a home on that site. They are as follows;

A. Assuming this built home would consist of (2) children, would the new taxes generated by the new owners cover the cost of the education of the children, trash collection and /or other unforeseen cost associated with having a home built on that site?

B. While the estimated market value of this property is at roughly \$20,000.00 and considering the depressed housing markets of today is that number valid or would the city consider a lower (non-contribution) sale price?

C. With the Webster School development into low income housing coupled with other low income/subsidized housing already in place in the neighborhood would it be wise to add yet another low income situation in the area. It seems like the whole area is being sighted as a lower income area which could have negative effects throughout the neighborhood.

D. I do feel that the sale of this property to Joanne and Patrick could only better the area as it would provide for a "green place" for many of the neighborhood's younger children to play at no cost to the city. While we know there are parks near by, I can attest to the fact that not only are the parks available to the kids but also drugs and alcohol. Being an abutter to the property, I have first hand knowledge of the kids activities in this open space and have nothing but good words to say about. Not only do the parents of the kids who play there exhibit very good manners and are respectful of their neighbors rights to privacy and quiet but the kids themselves are great kids and rarely if ever play outside without adult supervision. I would like to say at this point that due the present house design and lot size, Patrick and Joanne's yard offers very little in actual play space and as any parent can tell you--a kid who has a safe place to play is a happy kid.

While I can appreciate the city of Auburn's desire to remove this site from their possession and do commend the possible contribution of this land to a noble cause I do feel that the best interest of the neighborhood as a whole would be much better served if some kind of workable deal could be made with the present abutters in question-namely, Patrick and Joanne. Since the demolition of the building on that site six years ago, Patrick, Joanne and the abutters on the other side of the property have done an excellent job of maintaining the property and has given the neighborhood a clean, green and safe place for kids to play and for family bonding time. To me, it is a rare moment when the city government can move an issue in a way that satisfies theirs needs, the needs of a few and the needs and desires of a neighborhood as a whole in a positive manner in which everyone may benefit.

Re: Amendment to Chapter 21, Sections 1.15 and 1.9 – Sprinkler Systems

In reviewing a recent City Council agenda package for the meeting of December 15th, I observed consideration is being given to amending Section 1.15 of the ordinance which would eliminate the need to provide a sprinkler system in new "buildings over 200,000 cubic feet in volume". As noted in the information provided, this ordinance has been in existence since 1982.

Before the Council adopts this change I want to provide information to the Council that they may not have been aware of regarding potential ramifications that this ordinance may have.

In addition to the previously discussed public safety and fire fighter safety issues, the Council may not have been aware that the proposed ordinance change will also result in a cost shift from private business to the general public in Auburn .

Impact on Fire Insurance Ratings:

The presence of private sprinkler systems in large buildings has a direct impact on fire insurance ratings for the entire community. The lack of sprinkler systems may result in time with a change in Auburn's ISO rating. A lowering of Auburn's ISO rating will result in higher insurance premiums for all properties in Auburn.

ISO provides information through the Public Protection Classification (PPC) program to help establish appropriate fire insurance premiums for residential and commercial properties. Insurance companies rely on ISO for reliable, up-to-date information about a community's fire-protection services. ISO collects information on municipal fire-protection efforts in communities throughout the United States. In each of those communities, ISO analyzes the relevant data using our Fire Suppression Rating Schedule (FSRS), and assigns a Public Protection Classification from 1 to 10. Class 1 generally represents superior property fire protection, and Class 10 indicates that the area's fire-suppression program doesn't meet ISO's minimum criteria. Auburn currently has a 7 FSRS.

By classifying communities' ability to suppress fires, ISO helps the communities evaluate their public fire-protection services. The program provides an objective, countrywide standard that helps fire departments in planning and budgeting for facilities, equipment, and

training. And by securing lower fire insurance premiums for communities with better public protection, the PPC program provides incentives and rewards for communities that choose to improve their firefighting services.

ISO typically rates communities every 7 to 10 years. I have been involved in the last two Auburn ratings. I recall specific large buildings (constructed prior to 1982 with adoption of the current ordinance) that were identified as "deficiencies" in the last rating and impacting the City's overall rating. I suggest the City officials may want to talk with representatives from ISO before adoption of the ordinance change.

Impact on Public Fire Hydrant User Rate:

The proposed ordinance change will over time have an impact on water user rates. The current \$2.9M water budget includes 17% of total revenues from public fire protection fees for public fire protection hydrants. Nearly 8% of the total budget revenues come from Private Fire Protection charges for private sprinkler and fire hydrants.

The reduction in revenues from private fire protection charges (sprinklers) will result over time in a cost shift to other users including public fire hydrant charges as well as other private fire protection customers. This will not happen overnight; the shift in cost will probably be slow but consistent.

In discussing the proposed ordinance change, I understanding the Council also considered the low percent (22%) of area served by the current water distribution system. Please note this reflects 22% of the land area not the population served. In fact the public water system consisting 140 miles of water mains and 616 public fire hydrants serves 6,539 individual service accounts. The current water service area represents 80% of the population in Auburn.

I would like to suggest instead of complete elimination of Section 1.15 of the ordinance, the Council consider amendment to the appeal process described in Section 1.9 that would allow greater flexibility to the Fire Chief in reviewing specific project needs and impacts.

Please let me know if you want to discuss this in more detail.

Chapter 21

City of Auburn Ordinances

Section 1.15 Sprinkler and Alarm Systems Required*

- a. Approved automatic sprinkler systems shall be installed in all buildings in which construction exceeds any of the following criteria:
 - 1. Three (3) stories in height
 - 2. Forty (40) feet in height
 - 3. Two hundred thousand (200,000) cubic feet in volume
 - 4.3. Five (5) dwelling units but only when the structure housing such dwelling units exceeds two (2) stories in height.
- b. All such sprinkler systems shall be equipped with approved supervisory equipment which will transmit an alarm to an approved receiver.
- c. This section shall apply only to applications for building permits after the effective date of this section for the construction of new buildings or to make substantial renovations in existing buildings where the remodeled building will exceed the criteria set forth in subsection (a). In the case of existing buildings being substantially remodeled, the Fire Chief or the Deputy Chief in charge of fire prevention may grant a waiver from compliance with the requirements of this section where it is determined that the permittee will suffer economic hardship and the cost of the system will be disproportionate to the cost of the renovations and/or the fire danger involved.
- d. In all cases where sprinkler systems are installed, whether or not required by this section, no such system shall be modified, extended or altered without notification to the Auburn Fire Department.
- e. Once an automatic sprinkler system has been installed and is operational, no one shall remove it or cause the water supply to be disconnected or interrupted without first notifying the Fire Department nor shall any such system be tested without the knowledge of the Fire Department.
- f. Approvals of sprinkler systems and supervisory equipment shall be made by the Chief of the Fire Department or the Deputy Chief in charge of fire protection in accordance with standards of quality and efficiency generally accepted in the industry.

*Added 6/7/82

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Section 1.9 APPEALS

Appeals from determinations of the Fire Inspector that violations of the Fire Prevention Code of the Life Safety Code have occurred shall be taken to the Auburn Fire Chief. Appeals from decisions of the Fire Chief shall be taken to Superior Court,

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Any person shall have the right to appeal determinations of the Fire Inspector to the: 1) Auburn Fire Chief, then 2) Auburn City Manager, and/or 3) the Board of Appeals and/or 4) to the Superior Court.

An application for appeal shall be based on a claim that the true intent of this code or the rules legally adopted there under have been incorrectly interpreted, the provisions of this code do not fully apply, or an equivalent form of construction is to be used.

At the discretion of the City Council when the case warrants, there shall be an opportunity for the City Council to enter into a land purchase installment contract with a prior owner that may request and meets the criteria as determined by the City Council. The contact may vary depending on each case at the discretion of the City Council.
- 3. If the property is not transacted in accordance with the above, the Treasurer is to initiate the bid process to the public using the City's existing bid procedures with the City Council making the final decision.
