#### X. ADJOURNMENT

**Executive Session**: On occasion, the City Council discusses matters which are required or allowed by State law to be considered in executive session. Executive sessions are not open to the public. The matters that are discussed in executive session are required to be kept confidential until they become a matter of public discussion. In order to go into executive session, a Councilor must make a motion in public. The motion must be recorded, and 3/5 of the members of the Council must vote to go into executive session. An executive session is not required to be scheduled in advance as an agenda item, although when it is known at the time that the agenda is finalized, it will be listed on the agenda. The only topics which may be discussed in executive session are those that fall within one of the categories set forth in Title 1 M.R.S.A. Section 405. Those applicable to municipal government are:

- A. Discussion of personnel issues
- B. Discussion or consideration by a school board of suspension of expulsion
- C. Labor contracts
- D. Contemplated litigation
- E. Discussions of information contained in records made, maintained or received by a body or agency when access by the general public to those records is prohibited by statute;
- F. Discussion or approval of the content of examinations administered by a body or agency for licensing, permitting or employment purposes; consultation between a body or agency and any entity that provides examination services to that body or agency regarding the content of an examination; and review of examinations with the person examined; and
- G. Consultations between municipal officers and a code enforcement officer representing the municipality pursuant to Title 30-A, section 4452, subsection 1, paragraph in the prosecution of an enforcement matter pending in District Court when the consultation relates to that pending enforcement matter.

# FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT REPORT DECEMBER 2009

Attached please find the financial report for the month of December 2009. As a guideline for tracking purposes, revenues and expenditures should amount to approximately 50% of the annual budget. However, not all costs and revenues are distributed evenly throughout the year; individual line items can vary based upon cyclical activity.

### Revenues

Revenues collected through December 31<sup>st</sup> were \$36,495,966, or 53.23%, of the budget. The accounts listed below are noteworthy.

- A. Excise tax collected for the month of December is \$201,586. Excise tax collected through December is at 47.57%. This is a \$107,570 decrease from last December and a \$174,441 decrease from fiscal year 2007.
- B. State Revenue Sharing for the month of December is \$238,299 which is 16% more than December 2008. The total percent of budget is 45% which is 5% less than projected. The State's original projection for fiscal year 2009 was \$3,667,110 which was then decreased to \$3,451,184 than decreased to \$3,110,749 and now further decreased to \$2,746,140.
- C. Penalties & Interest are above anticipation by 36% due to collection of prior year's real estate and personal property taxes in the month of December, whereby \$66,353 was collected.

### CITY OF AUBURN FINANCIALS –DECEMBER 2009

### **Expenditures**

Expenditures through December 31<sup>st</sup> were \$34,086,961 or 52.06%, of the budget. Noteworthy variances are:

- A. Financial Services: Finance is slightly over budget due to temporary help during two employee's leave and the ordering of protection mats under the office chairs to save the rugs from further wear and tear.
- B. Workers Compensation: Transfer from general fund to the workers compensation account from City and School was completed in December to cover expenses.
- C. Police Department: Police Department is slightly over budget due to overtime sick (86% expended), overtime regular (84% expended), overtime court (81% expended).

### <u>Investments</u>

This section contains an investment schedule as of December 31<sup>st</sup>, as well as a comparison of the investments between December 31<sup>st</sup> and the prior month. Currently the City's funds are earning an average interest rate of .36%, compared to approximately .75% last year at this time.


