- An organized scaling back of government spending
- New regional organizations to deliver services
- Economic development
- Education
- Safe Neighborhoods

### **DISCUSSION NOTES**

Points of view included:

#### An organized scaling back of government spending

- Careful selection of choices while scaling back-not hasty last minute decisions
- Which roads to be repair less, etc.
- Cover basics first.
- Arts less important.
- What can private funds cover?

#### New regional organizations to deliver more cost-effective services

- Lewiston & Auburn already share many services: water, water treatment, Economic Growth Council, Airport, Gt Falls TV, buses, railroad, joint purchasing.
- Also share services with neighboring communities, e.g the library serves Minot too.
- Are there next steps? More services to be shared? Combine cities? If combine more local governments, how will people continue to feel empowered?

- Who should provide 911? City? County? Redundancy?
- Is the role of county government obsolete? Need new regional groupings? Are there too many layers of government? Local, county, state? Time to retool?

## **Economic development**

- Need more marketing of industrial potential.
- Need to more aggressively go out and recruit businesses to come here.
- Industrial growth reduces pressures on residential property tax.
- Have high quality infrastructure, needs more utilization.
- Lots to be proud of here.

#### **Education**

- Auburn's education system should be excellent.
- Can we afford school tax increases?
- Quality education is essential to future economic development.
- Need to make sure all investments are good investments.
- Need to explain new ways of learning. Takes time.
- Difficult to justify expanded school spending at a time of government retrenchment.
- School buildings must be maintained.
- The current high school is an investment that lasted a long time. Worn out now.

#### Safety & neighborhoods

- Want liveable walkable neighborhoods.
- Need to attract and retain young families with quality of life.

• Housing stock must be quality.

## Other

- Need to create a shared vision for the community—very important for economic development.
- More assets here than many people know e.g. world-class water treatment
- Need more citizen participation.
- Need more ways to find out what's here.
