### Assessing

- For the past two weeks staff has been working on preparations for the tax commitment. As of today we have completed proofing the real estate, personal property and exemption files which are scheduled to be transferred to the Tax Collector Monday, July 25<sup>th</sup>.
- > The final taxable valuations are as follows:
  - Taxable valuation of real estate: \$1,852,057,439.
  - Taxable valuation of PP: \$146,229,300
  - Total taxable valuation: \$1,998,286,739

## Auburn Public Library

- The Board of Trustees did not meet this month. The next meeting will be on Weds., Aug. 17<sup>th</sup> at 7:30 a.m.
- The Library Director attended the Maine STEM Council's annual meeting in Brunswick on Mon., 7/18. It was a great networking opportunity with presentations made by employers, the Dept. of Labor, and students involved in STEM education.
- The Library Director participated in a site visit in Augusta by the National Endowment for the Humanities to assess the Maine Humanities Council. We were one of four public libraries asked to attend along with Maine State Library personnel and an academic library representative. MHC provides incredible service to libraries through programming and grants.
- The Adult Services Manager attended a Center for Disease Control training in Augusta on vector borne diseases caused by ticks and mosquitos. The purpose of the event was to train individuals who might like to become "local experts" on ticks and mosquitoes. Library staffs were welcomed and encouraged to attend.

- Customer service statistics were recently measured and the numbers indicated a projected increase in customer interaction and requests for service. The final tallies project the number of interactions to be 49,764 for the year. Just over 47,000 interactions were recorded for FY2015.

- For the week of July 14<sup>th</sup> to July 20<sup>th</sup>, we responded to 96 calls for service. These include, but are not limited to: 3 fire calls, 67 Emergency Medical calls, 6 Motor Vehicle Accidents 4 with injuries, 2 Hazardous Condition calls, 7 Service calls, 1 unauthorized fire call and 9 fire alarm calls. We received 0 mutual aid responses during this period and we provided 0 mutual aid responses. We provided 1 Paramedic intercept during this period and transported 2 patients from Lewiston for UAS.

# IT

- This week, we took receipt of the GIS-based tree inventory data collected by Davey Resource Group. We have provided a preliminary map and summary to the Engineering department, and will work with them over the next few weeks to create an online map that will highlight pertinent information from the inventory.
- GIS Staff created a number of wall maps for various departments --- Two sizes of School District maps, a several engineering scale maps (aerial photos), and a city street map including police beats. The maps are currently being reviewed by the requesting departments for potential edits/updates.
- On Tuesday, a normally placid ProCurve switch decided to re-invent itself as a pyrotechnic device. This left our Police Administration area without network

connections or phones – in the middle of their CALEA accreditation process! I was away on vacation and of only limited help, so Rosemary Mosher took charge. Several others stepped up to help us resolve the issue, and I'd like to acknowledge their contributions:

- From Lewiston MIS, Craig Starr brought his expertise and an older switch that was compatible with our fiber
- From the LA911 CommCenter, Drew McKinley and Matt Charest contributed their expertise and TRIED to contribute a switch and a cable (which would have worked except that our fiber module was too old for it!)

I, and the City, am truly grateful for this "mutual assistance"! It's reassuring to know that we have such resources close to hand.

### Police

- > The department handled 587 calls for service this week.
- > Officers conducted 114 motor vehicle stops and 25 field interviews.
- Officers investigated 92 offenses of which, 7 of which were felonies, generating 15 arrests, 21 criminal summonses and 3 juvenile arrests.
- > Officers responded to 48 motor vehicle crashes.

### **Public Services**

- 2016 Reclamation Project (Townsend Brook Road, Pettingill Park)- asphalt base course complete in Pettingill Park. Raising structures to grade and curb work. Drainage structures completed on Townsend Brook Road, roadway to be reclaimed next week.
- 2016 Reconstruction Project (Highland Ave) project awarded to Longchamps. AWSD to complete their utility work by end of July. Road construction to begin next week.
- 2016 MPI Project (South Main Street)- project has been awarded to Gendron & Gendron, stormdrain installation in progress
- > Barker Mill Trail- project 95% complete
- Stormwater Compliance- on-going
- 2017 Hampshire Street Reconstruction- Gorrill Palmer has been selected for Consultant Services. 50% drawings now available. Landscaping and lighting plan being developed.
- > Ash Landfill forced sewer main- project in design phase
- Crews continue maintenance on all fields including lining, dragging, mowing, weed-whacking, checking the bases, even general maintenance on stands if needed.
- > Roadside mowing continues throughout the city.
- Residents along with the Com Center continue to call to have deceased animals picked up as well as for potholes, large pieces of road debris (TV's, couch, chairs) etc.
- Crews were out and about cleaning up graffiti at some of the Parks that were reported.

- The Excavation Technician was busy marking out dig safe's, inspecting both private and street excavations, reviewing and issuing Fill, Drive Opening permits as well as billing and continues GIS work.
- Sign work around the city continues; replacing and or fixing faded and damaged signs.
