DATE: Week Ending January 27, 2017

Assessing

- ➤ October deeds and Declarations of Value have been loaded and proofed. Staff has begun loading the November deeds and Declarations of Value. December deeds have not been received.
- > Staff has been out in the field working on permit inspections. In addition they have been accompanying Mark Stambach on his inspections of completed new construction for issuance of certificate of occupancies. When both the Code Enforcement and Assessing staff are able to do their inspections at the same time it is a lesser inconvenience for the homeowner.
- ➤ January 26, 2017 is the abatement deadline for the 2016 tax year. As of today we have one pending residential abatement application and three pending commercial abatement applications for the 2016 tax year.
- ➤ Cell tower ownership has historically been very difficult to track due to companies changing corporate names and merges between one or more companies. Often the Assessing Department does not get notification of the name change until the tax bills go out and the company calls to make the correction. In an attempt to make sure the correct real estate ownership is listed in the property records as well as ownership of the personal property located at the sites, staff has been working on verifying this information for sites throughout the City. We currently have nineteen sites listed in the database. Letters have been sent to each of the owners currently listed on the Assessing records requesting verification of ownership, location of each tower, number of antennas, ownership of the antennas and ownership of the supporting equipment at each site. To date four responses have been received.

- We are still accepting applications for several board and committee seats that are vacant
 the application deadline for this round of appointments is January 27, 2017
- > Staff attended Safety training on Wednesday, January 25th
- ➤ Data, Research, and Vital Statistics is in the process of implementing the Electronic Marriage Registration System (EMRS). Once all Clerk's, Deputy Clerk's and Assistant Clerk's are trained, we will begin issuing marriage licenses from the EMRS. The City Clerk attended the training on Thursday, January 26th. DRVS anticipates full deployment of the EMRS by July of 2017.

Economic and Community Development

- Meetings between Lewiston and Auburn have begun as we anticipate the Notice of Funding Availability (NOFA) for the next Lead Hazard Control Grant. The NOFA was scheduled to be released in January but the incoming administration has delayed the process. We will be eligible to apply for up to \$3 million dollars in funding.
- ➤ The Bridges Out of Poverty Steering Committee has resumed their monthly meetings. This is a regional group with the common goal of ending generational poverty.

Week Ending January 27, 2017

- > Staff met with three Auburn based businesses considering expanding and/or relocating their successful businesses.
- Taco Bell's tentative opening date is February 6Th (we will confirm this next Monday) and Krispy Kreme is still projecting opening sometime in May.
- > The Chinese government recently tightened the restrictions on money being transferred out of China. The two current projects (Miracle and Prospect Hill) will be experiencing different impacts; both projects are still moving forward. We will be hosting more foreign investors in May.
- > The new Aroma Joes' at 166 Center Street is planning on a soft opening in February.
- ➤ Staff attended the Maine Real Estate & Development Association annual forecast conference in Portland on January 19th and came away with a positive outlook on development trends for the LA area and numerous ideas on how to better market Auburn.
- > Staff held a field review of 88 Newbury Street for a possible community garden.
- ➤ The Urban Development Coordinator attended a New Auburn Neighborhood Watch meeting and presented CDBG grant information and a New Auburn Redevelopment update.
- The Urban Development Coordinator and Economic Development Staff hosted a second Saint Louis Bells meeting on Friday, January 27 with the goal of getting more public feedback and to present a proposal for CMCC Architecture and Civil Engineering students help with the design and site selection of the Saint Louis Bells.
- > Staff worked to help get licenses in place for L/A Arts and Winterfest food and drinks.
- > Staff is working with a deer farmer on a potential location in Auburn.
- > The structures at 741 Broad Street should be completely removed over the weekend.
- > Staff is working on an RFP and deed reviews of two Downtown Target Area Parcels for the first CC Meeting in February. There is development interest in one of them already.
- > Staff is participating in the Gulf Island Dam failure response planning and finishing up CRS Floodplain reporting.
- ➤ The State moratorium on Recreational Marijuana sales and commercial production was passed by legislators Thursday. This will give us until February 1, 2018 to participate in State rulemaking and address any local concerns if the Governor signs it.
- ➤ The former Spurwink School facility will be adding to the residential care component and reducing the educational use space on Danville Corner Road. A \$1,200,000 renovation is planned.
- ➤ Planning Board applications and renewals are due today and it looks like we will have a full complement of applications to fill the Board with renewals and new applicants.

Fire

- Crews responded to 3 fire calls during this time period.
- > Crews responded with the Rescue Boat for a potential jumper from the Longley Bridge. The boat was launched and stood by until the jumper was convinced to comeback over the railing by APD. Subject was transported to the hospital.
- > Staff performed several follow up inspections, site inspections and met with a potential new business owner.

Week Ending January 27, 2017

- Electricians completed work on the light upgrade for Central Station.
- > Crews attended training on Cardiac Emergencies.
- Crews attended the annual BLS/OSHA refresher training.
- Crews did Ice Rescue refresher training.
- > Crews performed 9 inspections, 3 of which were for licenses.
- ➤ For the week of January 19th to January 25th, we responded to 86 calls for service. These include, but are not limited to: 3 fire calls, 1 Swift Water Rescue call, 56 Emergency Medical calls, 10 Motor Vehicle Accidents 2 with injuries, 4 Hazardous Condition calls, 6 Service calls, and 5 fire alarm calls. We received 0 mutual aid responses during this period and we provided 0 mutual aid responses. We provided 2 Paramedic intercept during this time and responded to Lewiston for 1 patient for UAS.

IT

- ➤ GIS staff created a template that will provide an easy way to create individual pdf files for specific parcels. This is useful for staff use, as well as for requests from realtors and citizens. We will ask several departments to review the template, and then may consider creating a pdf 'library' of maps for each parcel that can be linked to a MapAuburn download.
- > Staff created the first abutter list using apartment data received from the Maine Office of GIS (data source USPS). Currently, we do not have an automated procedure for accessing this data, so it has been added to our To Do list.
- > Staff met with faculty from Bates College to discuss ways that their students can work with us on several potential projects. We are considering a GIS project that will explore land use.
- ➤ GFTV staff recorded the regular Council meeting, and the Consolidation Commission meeting at the Franco Center. Staff continue to work with School staff on the studio deployment. The Council meeting is available on the video archive and on the City's YouTube channel, and the Consolidation meetings is available on the archive.
- ➤ Staff took advantage of the weather-related building closure on Tuesday to make some UPS updates to the server room. This should put an end to the beeping alarm that was so clearly audible in the Patrol area. We were also able to update several pieces of software, since no staff were using them. Staff did inadvertently (and embarrassingly) set off the building burglar alarm, which APD had activated due to the building closure. I tried to disarm it, under pressure, but put in my code for the Monmouth Fish & Game, instead of the Auburn Hall one. That didn't work out well.

Police

- ➤ The department handled 501 calls for service this week.
- Officers conducted 139 motor vehicle stops.
- Officers investigated 69 offenses of which, 6 of which were felonies, generating 14 arrests, 26 criminal summonses and 4 juvenile arrests.
- Officers responded to 38 motor vehicle crashes.

Public Services

- > Public Services crews worked a 16-hour shift during this week's past ice/rain/slush storm
- > Crews are working hard in assisting the Recreation Department in this weekend's annual Winter Festival;. Crews are building a snow fort downtown, clearing snow at Festival Plaza for the farm animals as well as other behind the scene preparations.
- > In-house, work continues on tire chains, mailboxes and other items in need of repair Crews were out cold patching potholes around the city.
- Snow removal continues around the City in the priority areas
- > Crews continue to try and keep up on sanding and clearing City sidewalks. The changing weather between rain and snow, as well as temperature changes, vehicle breakdowns, has made it difficult for crews to keep up.
- > Sign work around the city continues; replacing and or fixing faded and damaged signs by the new regulations.
- > Public Services still receives calls to pick up road debris as well as dead animals.
- > The Engineering Technician/GIS has been working with IT on a geodatabase for the collector application.

- This week our mechanics and welder crew worked on transmissions, replacing clutch's, PTO clutch, changed out a tire on the Fire Dept Rescue Truck as well as replaced a valve on the Fire Departments 316 plow; performed five road calls and three state inspections as well as ten preventative maintenance on our equipment. Also, fabricated an electrical box as well as a new calcium tank mount. Lastly, to be cost effective our mechanic will rebuild the engine in #50 the sweeper in time for spring street sweeping.

- ➤ Engineering staff are reviewing the General Consulting RFQs. The Hampshire Street Reconstruction Project will be out in a couple of weeks and Lake Street is being surveyed.
