Subject: Executive Session

Information: Contract negotiations, pursuant to 1 M.R.S.A. Section 405(6) (D).

Executive Session: On occasion, the City Council discusses matters which are required or allowed by State law to be considered in executive session. Executive sessions are not open to the public. The matters that are discussed in executive session are required to be kept confidential until they become a matter of public discussion. In order to go into executive session, a Councilor must make a motion in public. The motion must be recorded, and 3/5 of the members of the Council must vote to go into executive session. An executive session is not required to be scheduled in advance as an agenda item, although when it is known at the time that the agenda is finalized, it will be listed on the agenda. The only topics which may be discussed in executive session are those that fall within one of the categories set forth in Title 1 M.R.S.A. Section 405(6). Those applicable to municipal government are:

- A. Discussion or consideration of the employment, appointment, assignment, duties, promotion, demotion, compensation, evaluation, disciplining, resignation or dismissal of an individual or group of public officials, appointees or employees of the body or agency or the investigation or hearing of charges or complaints against a person or persons subject to the following conditions:
- (1) An executive session may be held only if public discussion could be reasonably expected to cause damage to the individual's reputation or the individual's right to privacy would be violated;
- (2) Any person charged or investigated must be permitted to be present at an executive session if that person so desires;
- (3) Any person charged or investigated may request in writing that the investigation or hearing of charges or complaints against that person be conducted in open session. A request, if made to the agency, must be honored; and
- (4) Any person bringing charges, complaints or allegations of misconduct against the individual under discussion must be permitted to be present. This paragraph does not apply to discussion of a budget or budget proposal;
- B. Discussion or consideration by a school board of suspension or expulsion of a public school student or a student at a private school, the cost of whose education is paid from public funds, as long as:
- (1) The student and legal counsel and, if the student is a minor, the student's parents or legal guardians are permitted to be present at an executive session if the student, parents or guardians so desire;
- C. Discussion or consideration of the condition, acquisition or the use of real or personal property permanently attached to real property or interests therein or disposition of publicly held property or economic development only if premature disclosures of the information would prejudice the competitive or bargaining position of the body or agency;
- D. Discussion of labor contracts and proposals and meetings between a public agency and its negotiators. The parties must be named before the body or agency may go into executive session. Negotiations between the representatives of a public employer and public employees may be open to the public if both parties agree to conduct negotiations in open sessions;
- E. Consultations between a body or agency and its attorney concerning the legal rights and duties of the body or agency, pending or contemplated litigation, settlement offers and matters where the duties of the public body's or agency's counsel to the attorney's client pursuant to the code of professional responsibility clearly conflict with this subchapter or where premature general public knowledge would clearly place the State, municipality or other public agency or person at a substantial disadvantage;
- F. Discussions of information contained in records made, maintained or received by a body or agency when access by the general public to those records is prohibited by statute;
- G. Discussion or approval of the content of examinations administered by a body or agency for licensing, permitting or employment purposes; consultation between a body or agency and any entity that provides examination services to that body or agency regarding the content of an examination; and review of examinations with the person examined; and
- H. Consultations between municipal officers and a code enforcement officer representing the municipality pursuant to Title 30-A, section 4452, subsection 1, paragraph C in the prosecution of an enforcement matter pending in District Court when the consultation relates to that pending enforcement matter.

AGE-FRIENDLY ANNUAL REPORT January 1 through December 31, 2021

Good evening, Mayor Levesque, City Manager Crowell, City Councilors and City Staff

As the pandemic persisted, our events were challenging, and continued to be changed and limited, but as you will see, it did not stop us! Our thirteen-member committee has been meeting every month, all year long, with some attending from the general public.

The Age-Friendly Community Committee hosted a combination Christmas Party and New Year's Day Celebration on January 1, 2021, complete with a luncheon of finger rolls, chips, pickles, olives, dessert and beverage, served free of charge. We were able to find the previous night's ball drop from Times Square in New York, and replayed it at 11:59 a.m. with the ball dropping at 12:00 Noon. Attendees celebrated with hats and noise makers. They played games and had a great time.

February 14th, we hosted a Valentine's Day luncheon of spaghetti and meatballs, salad, bread and butter, dessert and beverages. We took in \$370.00 in donations. Our sponsor for the event was John Morrison from Cure Cannabis Co., who gave \$1000.00 toward this and future events.

Beginning March 17th, Age-Friendly started showing movies on the first and third Wednesdays of each month, in lieu of the First Auburn Senior Citizens meetings. No food was allowed at this time. Masks were mandatory and we had a 30 person maximum, with pre-registration being required. Attendees were permitted to bring a beverage.

March 30, 2021, Age-Friendly held a "Walk in the Park", a guided tour of the parks in Auburn, lead by Alan Manoian. The walk began at Festival Plaza and continued down Main Street to the new Anniversary Park. A total of 42 people attended, and masks were mandatory.

On April 23, 2021, Age-Friendly hosted a luncheon from 12:00 to 2:00 p.m., of beef stew, bread and butter, cookies and bottled water. A total of 250 people were served, between the eat-in and take-out meals. Donations of \$330.00 were received.

At our April meeting, we discussed purchasing benches and trash receptacles to be placed at the art wall on Main Street and at the Esplanade, so that walkers would have a place to sit and rest. In June, we applied for a grant through the City of Auburn and recently received word that the grant was approved. The items will be ordered, and we will coordinate with Public Works to install the benches and trash receptacles once they are received.

Movies continued to be held each month. We would like to see more participation, however, the movies are very well received, and we are now allowed to serve refreshments, including cookies and popcorn.

In June, the mass gathering rules were lifted and mask wearing became optional. Seniors groups were able to start meeting again, which made it easier for us to get our event information out to the public. People were ready and even anxious to get out and do something.

In July, the group met with Theresa Lamare, In-Service Coordinator from Aging Excellence, who spoke to us about in-home assistance and other help that Aging Excellence offers, in order for people of all ages to stay in their homes. We hope to partner with Aging Excellence to help to reach our goal of enabling

our elderly population to live independently. The agency also offered to sponsor a dessert for one of our senior meals. A representative from Seniors Plus in Lewiston is also on our board.

In August, our movies continued to be held, but attendance was low. Unfortunately, because of licensing restrictions, we are unable to advertise the name of the movies we will be showing and that could be the reason for low attendance.

There was no Balloon Festival in August, so we lost an opportunity to raise money for the Age-Friendly Community Committee coffers, as we did with the beverage booth in 2020, raising approximately \$3000.00.

Larry Pelletier, one of our committee members, discovered graffiti at Bonney Park, while he was taking a walk, and it was reported to Public Works. The graffiti has since been removed. By having our members report anything that is amiss, we can get it addressed and rectified in a timely manner. Earlier in the season it was identified that the sidewalk on Court Street was dangerously in disrepair. Public Works was notified by Age-Friendly, and the sidewalk was subsequently repaired. We'd like to take this opportunity to thank Public Works for their responses to our requests.

In September, movies continued to be shown, and plans were made for our future events.

On October 23rd, Age-Friendly hosted an "Eat-In" and "To Go" beans and hot dogs luncheon from 12:00 to 1:30 p.m. No fee was charged, but donations were gratefully accepted. A total of \$207.00 was donated to go toward future events, and Mr. William Pepin generously sponsored this event.

On November 25, 2021, Thanksgiving Dinner was sponsored by John Morrison from Cure Cannabis Co, and David McCutcheon from Re-Energy Holdings, LLC. Approximately 200 dinners were served to people who otherwise would not have had a Thanksgiving meal available to them. Donations of \$386.12 were received to help with future events.

On December 22, 2021, we held a luncheon to celebrate the holidays with finger rolls, chips, pickles, olives, dessert and bottled water. Donations of \$59.00 were received at this event. Unfortunately, the weather was stormy and only about 40 people braved the weather and came out to the event. Everyone played card games and Corn Hole, and had a great time. Carol LePage, a member of First Auburn Senior Citizens, generously donated a diamond art picture to be raffled off. The winner was drawn at this event.

Plans were made for our New Year's Day celebration, but I won't tell you how that turned out until next year's report!

Subject: Disorderly Housing

Information: It is the responsibility of the city to protect the health, safety, and welfare of the residents of the Auburn by eliminating the proliferation of properties with occupants who disturb the peace and tranquility of their neighborhoods. Often, these incidents are occurring in housing units or rentals which are unoccupied by the owners. Inquiries have been done with other municipalities to determine how enforcement is being handled.

Many communities over the past few years have adopted a Disorderly Housing Ordinance. Communities have found that chronic unlawful or nuisance activity of various kinds on and near disorderly houses adversely affects the health, safety and welfare of citizens and diminishes the quality of life in neighborhoods where this chronic activity occurs. Chronic unlawful or nuisance activity constitutes a public nuisance and should be subject to abatement.

Most ordinances define a "disorderly house" as any building which the Police Department has visited a minimum number of times in any thirty (30) day period response to situations that are created by the owner, tenants, cohabitees, residents, guests or invitees and that would have a tendency to unreasonably disturb the community, the neighborhood or an ordinary individual in the vicinity of said building. This ordinance would not have an impact for someone calling for service as it relates to protection like a domestic assault, sexual assault, or protection from abuse orders.

Staff Recommended Action: Consider adopting the proposed ordinance.

ADOPTING A DISORDERLY HOUSING ORDINANCE

Be it ordained, that the City Council hereby adopt the Disorderly Housing Ordinance (attached).

CITY OF AUBURN DISORDERLY HOUSE ORDINANCE

SECTION 1. TITLE.

This Ordinance shall be known as the "City of Auburn Disorderly House Ordinance."

SECTION 2. PURPOSE.

The purpose of this Ordinance is to protect the health, safety, and welfare of the residents of the City of Auburn by eliminating the proliferation of properties with occupants who disturb the peace and tranquility of their neighborhoods. Nothing contained in this Ordinance is intended to dissuade, discourage or prohibit any person whose safety is in jeopardy, or who is a victim of domestic violence, from contacting the appropriate authorities, including, but not limited to, the Auburn Police Department.

SECTION 3. LEGISLATIVE FINDINGS.

The City Council hereby finds that:

- (a) The City has a substantial and compelling interest in protecting the health, safety, property, and welfare of its citizens and the neighborhoods affected by chronic unlawful or nuisance activity as well as in not dissuading, discouraging or prohibiting any person whose safety is in jeopardy, or who is a victim of domestic violence, from contacting the appropriate authorities.
- (b) Chronic unlawful or nuisance activity of various kinds on and near disorderly houses adversely affects the health, safety and welfare of citizens and diminishes the quality of life in neighborhoods where this chronic activity occurs. Chronic unlawful or nuisance activity constitutes a public nuisance and should be subject to abatement.
- (c) The existing ordinances and enforcement processes of the City do not adequately control chronic unlawful or nuisance activity or its detrimental effects on citizens and neighborhoods where such chronic activity occurs.
- (d) Establishing the regulatory framework contained herein will alleviate the problems created by chronic unlawful or nuisance activity through early intervention by the Police Department.

SECTION 4. DISORDERLY HOUSES PROHIBITED.

- (a) No person shall occupy as owner-occupant or shall allow another to occupy any dwelling, dwelling unit, or rooming house (hereinafter jointly and severally "building") which is a disorderly house as defined herein.
 - (b) A "disorderly house" is any building which:
 - (1) The Police Department has visited a minimum number of times in any thirty (30) day period response to situations that are created by the owner, tenants, or owner's or tenants' cohabitees, guests or invitees and that would have a tendency to unreasonably

disturb the community, the neighborhood or an ordinary individual in the vicinity of said building, including, but not limited to: loud music; boisterous parties; sounds emanating from within the structure which are audible outside the building; loud noise or fights within the building or in its vicinity involving tenants of the building or their invitees (excluding any request for police protection or any police intervention in the face of a threat or a perceived threat to person or property, or any request for the assistance of the police to enforce a court order, including, but not limited to, circumstances in which the request for assistance or other police intervention arises from an incident relating to domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault or stalking against any person at or near the building); owners, tenants, or invitees of owners or tenants being intoxicated on public ways in the vicinity of the building; other similar activities in the building or outside the building itself; or

(2) The police have visited three (3) or more times in any thirty (30) day period in response to situations which are created by the owner, tenants, or owner's or tenants' cohabitees, guests or invitees and involve the arrest or summons of owners or tenants or their invitees for activities which constitute either a crime or civil infraction under either state or local law (excluding arrests or summonses arising from an incident relating to domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault or stalking against any person at or nearthe building), or create a reasonable suspicion that illegal drug use or sales under 17-A M.R.S.A. Chapter 45 or prostitution or public indecency under 17-A M.R.S.A. Chapter 35 has occurred at the property.

(c) The situation to which the visit pertains shall be documented by the Police Department. Such documentation may include sworn affidavits by named citizens that may be sufficient to create a reasonable suspicion said illegal activity has occurred.

SECTION 5. NOTICE OF DISORDERLY HOUSE.

- (a) Whenever the Police Department has identified a building as a disorderly house, it shall cause written notification of the events that form the basis for that designation to be given to the owner. The notice shall require the owner to meet with representatives of the City (including the Police Department) within five (5) business days from the date of the written notification, or such other time as is agreed upon by the Police Chief or his/her designee, to identify ways in which the problems that have been identified will be eliminated.
- (b) At the time of said meeting, the owner shall be obligated to provide to the City the following documentation:
 - (1) A list of the names of all tenants or other persons authorized to reside or presently residing in the building and the units they occupy;

- (2) Copies of all leases or occupancy agreement(s) with tenants or other persons residing in the building (confidential personal or financial information may be omitted);
- (3) Contracts with any property manager or other person responsible for the orderly operation of the building; and

(4) Proof of building ownership.

In addition, the owner shall agree to take effective measures to address the disorderly house, which measures shall be memorialized in a written agreement at the conclusion of the meeting with the City and shall be implemented within one (1) week of said meeting unless another date is agreed upon by the Police Department. The Police Chief or his or her designee has authority to execute such agreements on behalf of the City. Failure to enter into such an agreement at the conclusion of the meeting will be deemed a violation of this Ordinance, and the City may file a complaint in court seeking all remedies permitted by law as set forth in Section 7 of this Ordinance.

- (c) If the same building should be classified as a disorderly house by the Police Department on a subsequent occasion within three (3) years, then the City is under no obligation to meet with the owner but may, after notice and hearing before the City Council, condemn and post the building or any units therein against occupancy as set forth in Section 7(a), and/or proceed directly with a complaint in court seeking all remedies permitted by law as set forth in Section 7(a).
- (d) The notices provided for in this section may be given to any person, including any legal entity having the right of legal title or the beneficial interest in the disorderly house or any portion thereof, as that interest is recorded in the assessing records of the City or the Registry of Deeds of Androscoggin County, which shall be sufficient for all legal purposes. Notice shall be provided to the owner and any non-owner occupants of the building (if known).

SECTION 6. ENFORCEMENT.

- (a) It shall be the duty of the Police Department to administer and enforce the provisions of this Ordinance. If the owner (a) refuses to meet with representatives of the City as set forth in Section 5 above, (b) refuses to agree to take effective measures to address the disorderly house, (c) takes ineffective measures to address the disorderly house as determined by the City, (d) fails to implement the agreement reached with the City to address the disorderly house, or (e) if, in the discretion of the City, the disorderly house requires immediate posting in order to protect the public health, safety or welfare, the City may condemn and post the building or any units therein against occupancy, and/or may file a legal action against the owner and/or violator seeking any and all remedies to which it is entitled pursuant to State and local laws, including, without limitation, declaratory and injunctive relief.
- (b) In the event that condemnation and posting the building or any units therein against occupancy is necessary to address the disorderly house, the City shall provide all non-owner occupants of the building with written notice of said condemnation at least thirty (30) days in advance of the act of condemnation or the posting against occupancy, if the list of tenants is known to the City.
- (c) In the event of legal action against an owner and/or violator for a disorderly house violation, the City shall name the non-owner occupants of the building (if known) as parties-in-interest to said legal action.

SECTION 7. VIOLATIONS.

Any person violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance or failing or neglecting or refusing to obey any order or notice of the Police Department issued hereunder shall be subject to a penalty as provided herein.

SECTION 8. CIVIL PENALTIES.

Any person who is found to be in violation of any provision of this Ordinance shall be subject to a civil penalty of not less than one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) and not more than two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00), or as otherwise provided by 30-A M.R.S.A. § 4452, as may be amended from time to time. Each violation of a separate provision of this Ordinance, and each day of violation, shall constitute separate offenses. In addition, if the City is the prevailing party in an enforcement action, said person shall also be liable for all reasonable expenses incurred by the City in the enforcement of this Ordinance, including, but not limited to, staff time, attorney's fees, and costs. All civil penalties shall inure to the benefit of the City of Auburn.

PART II - CODE OF ORDINANCES Chapter 2 - ADMINISTRATION ARTICLE V. - BOARDS, COMMISSIONS AND COMMITTEES DIVISION 5. CONSERVATION COMMISSION

DIVISION 5. CONSERVATION COMMISSION

Sec. 2-477. Commission established.

A conservation commission is hereby established pursuant to 30 A M.R.S.A. §§ 3261—3263 to consist of seven members appointed by the city council, all of whom shall be residents of the city. The terms of office shall be three years except that initial appointments after the date of adoption of the ordinance from which this division derives shall be such that the terms of no more than three members shall expire in any single year. For that purpose, the city council shall initially appoint three members for terms of one year, two members for terms of two years, and two members for terms of three years, such that the terms of approximately one-third of the members shall expire each year. There shall be one ex-officio member of the board consisting of the city manager or his/her designee.

(Ord. No. 07-02022015, § 1, 2-17-2015)

Sec. 2-478. Purpose.

The purpose of the conservation commission shall be to serve as a research, advisory and advocacy group on environmental and conservation issues relating to the city.

(Ord. No. 07-02022015, § 2, 2-17-2015)

Sec. 2-479. Qualifications.

All members of the commission shall be selected upon the basis of their knowledge of or interest in conservation, environmental science or related fields.

(Ord. No. 07-02022015, § 3, 2-17-2015)

Sec. 2-480. Powers and duties.

The commission:

- (1) Shall keep records of its meetings and activities and make an annual report to the city council;
- (2) Shall conduct research, in conjunction with the planning board, into local land areas, which shall be initiated by majority votes of both the commission and the planning board;
- (3) Shall seek to coordinate the activities of conservation bodies organized for similar purposes;
- (4) Shall keep an index of all open areas within the city, whether publicly or privately owned, including open marshlands, swamps and other wetlands, for the purpose of obtaining information relating to the proper protection, development or use of those open areas. The commission may recommend to the city council or to any board of the city or to any body politic or public agency of the state a program for the better protection, development or use of such open areas, which may include the acquisition of conservation easements;

- (5) May advertise, prepare, print and distribute books, maps, charts, plans and pamphlets which it considers necessary, if municipal appropriations provide financial resources to do so;
- (6) Shall assist staff in the preparation of park and trail plans, the identification of new sites to be added to the park system, recommendations on designation of open space areas, and grant assistance;
- (7) Shall coordinate applications for grants from the federal or state governments, or private sources, to improve conservation assets for the city including parks, trail and the community forest.
- (8) Shall undertake any other conservation or environmental activity referred to it by the city council.
- (9) May recommend to the city council the acceptance of gifts in the municipality's name for any of the commission's purposes.
- (10) Shall develop a plan for and provide advice to city staff and agencies regarding the management of the community forest including the anticipated impact of proposed development;
- (11) Shall raise community awareness regarding the importance of the community forest;
- (12) May raise funds to establish a community forest trust fund;
- (13) Shall adopt by-laws to govern the internal affairs of the commission; and
- (14) May perform such other functions as are permitted by this Code.

(Ord. No. 07-02022015, § 4, 2-17-2015)

Sec. 2-481. Officers, meetings and records.

- (a) The members shall elect from their membership a chairperson, treasurer, a vice-chairperson and a secretary.

 Officers shall serve two-year terms.
- (b) All meetings of the commission shall be open to the public, and notice, if required by law, should be provided to the public about such meetings.
- (c) Minutes shall be kept of all meetings.

(Ord. No. 07-02022015, § 5, 2-17-2015)

Sec. 2-482. Committees.

- (a) Establishment: The chairperson may appoint special committees for purposes and terms approved by the conservation commission.
- (b) Lewiston-Auburn Community Forest Board: The Lewiston-Auburn Community Forest Board will be a standing subcommittee of the Auburn Conservation Commission. The purpose of the community forest board is to plan for and provide advice to city staff and the conservation commission regarding the management of the community forest. The conservation commission shall designate two members to serve on the Lewiston-Auburn Community Forest Board. The Lewiston-Auburn Community Forest Board shall develop and implement a community forest program that enhances, preserves, protects, and maintains the community forest. Primary activities are to:
 - (1) Advocate for the community forest;
 - (2) Develop a plan for and provide advice on the management of the public sector portion of the community forest;
 - (3) Educate the communities about the community forest and how to care for it;

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- (4) Raise funds, including grants, and establish a community forest trust;
- (5) Develop and advise on policy changes for approval by the city councils;
- (6) Advise and consult on community forest issues and projects;
- (7) Communicate and coordinate with city staff, planning boards, and other community programs to avoid duplications of efforts and to combine resources to meet goals.

(Ord. No. 07-02022015, § 6, 2-17-2015)

Sec. 2-482.1. Limits of authority.

Nothing contained within this section shall supersede the provisions of the Charter or contrary provisions of the Code. No powers and duties which may be exercised by conservation commissions under state statute which are not explicitly provided in this article may be exercised by the commission created herein.

(Ord. No. 07-02022015, § 7, 2-17-2015)

DIVISION 8. AGRICULTURE COMMITTEE¹

Sec. 2-482.11. Purpose.

The purpose of the agriculture committee shall be to proactively build a stronger food, agricultural, and resource economy in the city and to address the ongoing needs of protecting and promoting farms, farmland, forestry businesses, woodlots, local agriculture economy and local forestry economy.

(Ord. No. 14-12022019, 12-9-2019; Ord. No. 20-12022019, 12-9-2019)

Sec. 2-482.12. Established.

An agriculture committee is hereby established to consist of nine members, of whom seven members shall be appointed by the city council and shall be residents of the city with highest priority given to selecting members who are actively engaged in agriculture or forestry. At least one member shall have professional experience in an area directly related to forestry and at least one shall have direct professional experience in an area related to agriculture. The other nonvoting members shall be residents or landowners. The seven regular members appointed by the city council shall appoint up to two nonvoting members.

The terms of office shall be three years except that initial appointments after the date of adoption of the ordinance from which this division derives shall be such that the terms of no more than three members shall expire in any single year. For that purpose, the city council shall initially appoint one members for terms of one year, three members for terms of two years, and three members for terms of three years, such that the terms of approximately one third of the members shall expire each year. Subsequent appointments shall be for a term of three years.

Sec. 2-482.13. Qualifications.

All members of the committee shall be selected upon the basis of their active involvement, interests, skill or expertise in agriculture, forestry, food system economics, public policy or related fields. All voting members shall be residents of the city.

Sec. 2-482.14. Powers and duties.

The committee shall:

- (1) Make recommendations to the planning board and city council and consult with the conservation commission regarding the ongoing needs of protecting and promoting farms, forestry businesses, farmland, woodlots and building a stronger food, agricultural and resource economy in the city.
- (2) Promote opportunities for farm financing and farm, forestry or natural resource business development proposals, conservation and preservation of agricultural lands and encourage the marketing of the city's agricultural and forestry products;
- (3) Seek to coordinate the activities of local, state and regional organizations of similar purposes and collaborate to assist with education of the community regarding food systems, agriculture and forestry;
- (4) Research methods, best practices and successful policies that other communities are using to strengthen and support agriculture and forestry and share information and ideas with community leaders.
- (5) Periodically review the city comprehensive plan, ordinances and land use trends that relate to agriculture and forestry in order to identify potential barriers and opportunities to modify the city's policies and ordinances to better support agriculture and forestry.
- (6) Support broad public participation in changes to municipal policies and ordinances that affect agriculture and forestry and provide opportunities for public input as changes are proposed.
- (7) Review applications for a voluntary municipal farm support program and perform related duties as requested by the city council.
- (8) Keep records of its meetings and activities and make an annual report to the city council;
- (9) Undertake any other agricultural or forestry related activity referred to it by the city council;
- (10) Adopt by-laws to govern the internal affairs of the committee including meeting frequency;
- (11) May perform such other functions as are permitted by this Code.
- (12) Should any project in the city require the submission of a farm plan, the committee shall review the farm plan and provide a recommendation to the planning board within 60 days.

Sec. 2-482.15. Officers, meetings and records.

(a) The members shall elect from their membership a chairperson, a vice-chairperson and a secretary. Officers shall serve two-year terms.

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- (b) All meetings of the committee shall be open to the public, and notice, shall be provided to the public about such meetings.
- (c) The committee may request that testimony provided during public hearings in front of the committee be provided under oath.
- (d) Minutes shall be kept of all meetings.

Sec. 2-482.16. Committees.

The committee may vote to create subcommittees and appoint members of such subcommittees to work on specific projects.

Sec. 2-482.17. Quorum and necessary vote.

As to any matter requiring a public hearing, no business shall be transacted by the committee without a quorum, consisting of at least half of the voting members of the committee. If less than a quorum is present, the hearing shall be rescheduled, and the members and other interested parties shall be notified of the rescheduling.

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ORDINANCE 06-02072022



IN CITY COUNCIL

Be it ordained, that the City Council hereby amends the Auburn Code of Ordinances, Chapter 2 – Administration, Article V. Boards, Commissions and Committees by striking Division 5, Conservation Commission and Division 8, Agriculture Committee and replacing Division 5 with Sustainability and Natural Resource Management Board as attached.

PART II - CODE OF ORDINANCES Chapter 2 - ADMINISTRATION ARTICLE V. - BOARDS, COMMISSIONS AND COMMITTEES DIVISION 5. Sustainability and Natural Resource Management Board

DIVISION 5. SUSTAINABILITY AND NATURAL RESOURCE MANAGEMENT BOARD (SNRB)

Sec. 2-477. Board established.

A Board is hereby established pursuant to 30-A M.R.S.A. §§ 3261—3263 to consist of six members, including representatives of the city council, planning board, and four standing working groups on agriculture, conservation, the community forest, and sustainability. The planning board chair and the mayor may either serve on this board or appoint a representative to serve as members of the SNRB for a term of two years. The standing working groups on agriculture, conservation, the community forest, and sustainability shall nominate one representative each for approval by the Council; these members shall serve staggered three-year terms. There shall be one ex officio member of the board, consisting of the city manager or his/her designee.

Sec. 2-478. Purpose.

The purpose of the SNRB shall be to advance Auburn's commitment to sustainability by serving as a research, advisory and advocacy group on environmental issues and natural resource management within the City. The SNRB is created with the purpose of improving the relationship and communication between the City Council, existing committees, and staff with the aim of creating more effective organization of city sustainability efforts.

Sec. 2-479. Qualifications.

All members of the SNRB shall be selected on the basis of their knowledge of or interest in conservation, environmental science, agriculture, forestry, energy or related fields.

Sec. 2-480. Powers and duties.

- (1) SNRB will provide an interface between City leadership (City Council/ Mayor/City Manager), and four standing working groups (Conservation, Community Forest, Agriculture, Sustainability). SNRB will assure communication and coordination among the standing working groups, Council, and city staff.
- SNRB will meet quarterly or as needed to set priorities for the standing working groups, review working group accomplishments, coordinate efforts, provide operating funds approved by the City Council for working group events, publications, etc. and develop brief quarterly updates for the Council. SNRB shall maintain a working relationship with the Planning Board.
- (3) The City shall identify staff to be resources for SNRB. It is not expected that staff attend all meetings, but rather attend or provide advice as needed.
- (4) SNRB may, upon approval by the City Manager or City Council advertise, and in coordination with the working groups, prepare, print and distribute books, maps, charts, plans and pamphlets which it considers necessary, if municipal appropriations provide financial resources to do so;
- (5) SNRB shall coordinate with City Manager any applications for grants from the federal or state governments, or private sources, to carry out the City's commitments to sustainability and responsible natural resource management;

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DIVISION 5. Sustainability and Natural Resource Management Board

- (6) SNRB may recommend to the city council the acceptance of gifts in the municipality's name for any of the commission's purposes;
- (7) SNRB may perform such other functions as are permitted by this Code.

Sec. 2-481. Officers, meetings and records.

- (1) SNRB shall appoint a chair and secretary.
- (2) SNRB shall appoint members of the 4 standing working groups. Working group membership will be between 5 and 11 depending on need and volunteer interest.
- (3) Standing working groups shall provide a quarterly report to the SNRB.
- (4) All meetings of the SNRB and standing working groups shall be open to the public, and notice, if required by law, should be provided to the public about such meetings.
- (5) Minutes shall be kept of all meetings. Minutes and agendas will be made public through the City's website.

Sec. 2-482. Standing Working Groups

Establishment: The SNRB will oversee four standing working groups, each of which will have a distinct focus on agriculture, conservation, the community forest, or sustainability. Goals of the working groups are outlined below.

Conservation Working Group

The Conservation Working Group will be a standing working group of the Auburn Sustainability and Natural Resource Management Commission. The purpose of the Conservation Working Group shall be to promote responsible stewardship of the natural environment in Auburn through research, advocacy, and education.

The Conservation Working Group:

- Shall seek to coordinate the activities of conservation and recreation bodies organized for similar purposes;
- b) In coordination with the City GIS staff shall keep an index of all open areas within the city, whether publicly or privately owned, including open marshlands, swamps and other wetlands, for the purpose of obtaining information relating to the proper protection, development or use of those open areas. The working group may recommend to the city council or to any Board of the city a program for the better protection, development or use of such open areas, which may include the acquisition of conservation easements.
- c) Shall promote public awareness and appreciation for Auburn's natural environment through a broad education program. This may include organizing events, distributing educational materials, and coordinating with local conservation organizations, both private and public.
- d) Shall support and advise City staff on the sustainable management of Auburn's natural resources, and promote cooperation and information-sharing with regional, state, and federal agencies.
- e) Shall provide advisory opinions and recommendations to the City Council, Planning Board, and other municipal elected or appointed officials on matters pertaining to natural resource management in Auburn.
- f) Shall assist with and coordinate applications for grants from the Federal or State governments, or private sources, to improve conservation assets for the city including parks, trails, and the community forest.

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DIVISION 5. Sustainability and Natural Resource Management Board

g) Shall undertake any other conservation or environmental activity referred to it by the city council.

Community Forest Working Group

The Lewiston-Auburn Community Forest Board will be a standing working group of the Auburn Sustainability and Natural Resource Management Commission. The Community Forest Working Group shall develop and implement a program that promotes the socio-economic, environmental, and esthetic values of the Community Forest.

The Community Forest Working Group:

- a) Shall advocate for Auburn's Community Forest, defined as the sum of street trees, trees associated with public facilities including parks and schools, and public woodlots under the jurisdiction of the City or the School Department.
- b) Shall maintain Auburn's Tree City USA certification which includes Maine Arbor Week Activities.
- c) Shall raise funds and develop grant applications to support the Community Forest.
- d) Shall collaborate and coordinate with public and private organizations including the working groups of the Sustainability & Natural Resources Board, Planning Board and City Council to provide advice, information and policy recommendations.
- e) Shall advise staff concerning the Street Tree Inventory and Public Woodlots Forest Management Plan.
- f) Shall meet jointly with representatives from Lewiston to maintain the Lewiston-Auburn Community Forest Board (LACFB) established and continually operating since 2001. LACFB jointly established and manages the tree nursery on North Auburn Road under an easement for the benefit of both cities.
- g) Shall provide education opportunities to the public to enhance understanding and appreciation of issues related to the Community Forest, including tree planting, tree care, invasive plant and insect issues, and the socio-economic benefits of the Community Forest.

Natural Products and Agriculture Working Group

The Natural Products Working Group will be a standing working group of the Sustainability and Natural Resource Management Board. The purpose of Auburn's Natural Products Working Group shall be to proactively build a stronger natural resource economy in Auburn and to address the ongoing needs of protecting and promoting farms, farmland, woodlots, and natural resources based industries.

The Natural Products Working Group shall:

- a) Work to protect soils of statewide importance
- b) Promote local resource based economies
- c) Undertake education and community outreach to promote local commodities
- d) Provide assistance and contacts for local agricultural and resource based commercial initiatives at the state and federal levels

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DIVISION 5. Sustainability and Natural Resource Management Board

- e) Raise funds and develop grant applications to support the goals of promoting natural products in Auburn.
- f) Review and provide recommendations concerning solar installations in AGRP zoned areas

f)g) Promote local food supplies and address local hunger issues.

Sustainability Working Group

The Sustainability Working Group will be a standing working group of the Auburn Sustainability and Natural Resource Management Commission. The mission of the Sustainability Working Group is to assist citizens of Auburn in making Auburn a Sustainable Community in the domains of environment, government operations, and culture.

The Sustainability Working Group:

- a) Through application of existing research and data acquired at the local level shall assist the city in developing policies and actions in sustainability that are aligned with the state's climate focus areas: modernization of buildings, transportation, emission reductions, environmental protection, healthy and resilient communities, investment in climate-ready infrastructure, and engagement of our citizens
- b) Shall assist City staff in identifying and securing grant funding to supplement city budget outlays for sustainability work.
- c) Shall work with the city staff and community partners to develop outcome metrics to measure the effectiveness of sustainability policies and actions. For example: do participation rates for curbside recycling or food composting increase with new recycling/compost bins and a targeted community education program?
- d) Shall collaborate with other community groups, the city and quasi-governmental groups to share resources and avoid duplication of efforts in pursuit of shared sustainability goals.
- e) Shall assist the city in budget planning to fund a Sustainability Manager position overseeing development of an Auburn Climate Action Plan, as well as current/future sustainability initiatives. Assist the city and the Sustainability Manager with the development of the Auburn Climate Action Plan.

Sec. 2-482.1. Limits of authority.

Nothing contained within this section shall supersede the provisions of the Charter or contrary provisions of the Code. No powers and duties which may be exercised by commissions under state statute which are not explicitly provided in this article may be exercised by the Board created herein.

WHEREAS, the City of Auburn (the "City") is authorized pursuant to Chapter 206 of Title 30-A of the Maine Revised Statutes, as amended, to designate specific areas within the City as the Tambrands II Tax Increment Financing District (the "District") and to adopt a development program for the District (the "Development Program"); and

WHEREAS, on November 6, 2000 the Auburn City Council designated the District and adopted a Development Program for the District (the "Original Development Program"), which received the approval from the Maine Department of Economic and Community Development (the "Department"); and

WHEREAS, the City desires to adopt the First Amendment to the District and Development Program (the "First Amendment") to continue to achieve the District's original goals by revising the percentage of taxes paid on captured assessed value allocated to Tambrands Inc. ("the Company") in the Credit Enhancement Agreement; and

WHEREAS, the City Council has held a public hearing on February 21, 2022, upon at least ten (10) days prior notice published in a newspaper of general circulation within the City, on the question of amending the Original Development Program and Credit Enhancement Agreement in accordance with the requirements of 30-A M.R.S.A. § 5226; and

WHEREAS, the City Council has considered the comments provided at the public hearing, both for and against the adoption of the First Amendment, if any; and

WHEREAS, it is expected that approval will be sought and obtained from the Department, approving the First Amendment; and

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF AUBURN, MAINE:

Section 1 The proposed First Amendment will contribute to the economic growth or well-being of the City or to the betterment of the health, welfare or safety of the inhabitants of the City. Pursuant to Title 30-A M.R.S.A. Section 5226(5), this First Amendment does not result in the District being out of compliance with any of the conditions of 30-A M.R.S.A. Section 5223(3) which include the percentage of area the District that is suitable for commercial use or other allowable uses, the acreage caps for single TIF districts and for all TIF districts in the City, and the total TIF district valuation cap. The City Council has considered any evidence presented regarding potential substantial detriments to a party's existing business and determined that any adverse economic effect of the proposed First Amendment on a party's existing business is outweighed by the contribution made by the First Amendment to the economic growth or well-being of the City or to the betterment of the health, welfare or safety of the inhabitants of the City.

Section 2 Pursuant to Chapter 206 of Title 30-A of the Maine Revised Statutes, as amended, the City Council hereby amends the Tambrands II Municipal Development Tax Increment Financing Development Program and adopts the First Amendment, all as more particularly described in the First Amendment presented to the

City Council herewith. Such First Amendment is hereby incorporated by reference into this vote as the Development Program for the District.


Section 3. The City Manager, or his duly appointed representative, is hereby authorized, empowered and directed to submit the proposed First Amendment to the Department for review and approval pursuant to the requirements of 30-A M.R.S.A. § 5226(2). In addition, the City Manager, or his duly appointed representative is hereby authorized, empowered, and directed to execute the amended Credit Enhancement Agreement on terms that are consistent with the First Amendment.

<u>Section 4.</u> The foregoing adoption of the First Amendment shall automatically become final and shall take full force and effect upon receipt by the City of approval of adoption of the First Amendment by the Department, without requirement of any further action by the City, the City Council, or any other party.

<u>Section 5.</u> The City Manager, or his duly appointed representative, is hereby authorized and empowered, at his discretion, from time to time, to make such revisions to the documents adopting the First Amendment as he may deem reasonably necessary or convenient in order to facilitate the process for review and approval of the First Amendment by the Department, so long as such revisions are not inconsistent with these resolutions or the basic structure and intent of the Council in adopting the First Amendment.

I. Introduction

A. Summary of the First Amendment to the #6 Proctor & Gamble (Tambrands II) TIF Development Program

The City seeks its first amendment (the "First Amendment") to the #6 Proctor & Gamble (Tambrands II) Tax Increment Financing ("TIF") District ("District") Development Program ("Development Program"). This First Amendment aims to (1) amend the percentage allocation of TIF revenues between the City and Tambrands Inc. (the "Company") so that for the remainder of the term, the Company will receive seventy-five percent (75%) of TIF revenues rather than forty percent (40%); and (2) to authorize an amendment to the existing Credit Enhancement Agreement (the "CEA") to modify the percentage allocations described above. The First Amendment is being undertaken to assist the Company with a new capital improvement project in the existing District. The Company plans to construct a 116,000-square foot manufacturing and warehouse building addition onto its existing facility, add 84,000-square feet of access drives and truck maneuvering areas, and associated stormwater and electrical infrastructure. Additionally, through these three changes, the City intends to further encourage and facilitate economic development within the District and in the City at large. To the extent this First Amendment does not address provisions of the original District and original Development Program, such original documents remain in full force and effect. Please note that the original Development Program for the District is attached as Exhibit A.

This First Amendment is structured and proposed pursuant to Chapter 206 of Title 30-A of the Maine Revised Statutes, as amended (the "<u>TIF Statute</u>").

B. The Existing District and Development Program

On November 6, 2000, the City of Auburn (the "City") designated the #6 Proctor & Gamble (Tambrands II) Municipal Development and Tax Increment Financing District and adopted the Development Program for the District. The Department of Economic and Community Development ("DECD") approved the original District and the original Development Program in March 30, 2001. The City created the District in order to assist the Company with the acquisition and installation of machinery and equipment and the development of additional research and manufacturing facilities. Additionally, the District was intended to create and retain employment opportunities, improve the City's tax base, and improve the general economy of the State. The term of the District is thirty (30) years. The acreage of the District is 84 acres and the original assessed value of the District is \$520,900. The District captured one hundred percent (100%) of the increase in the assessed value in the District as captured assessed value and the City retains sixty percent (60%) of the tax increment revenues from the District while paying the remaining forty percent (40%) to the Company through a CEA.

II. Development Program Amendment Narrative

A. Financial Plan

While the City will continue to capture the full one hundred percent (100%) of increased assessed value as captured assessed value, for the remaining nine years, starting in fiscal year 2022-2023, the City will retain twenty-five percent (25%) of the TIF revenues and allocate seventy-five percent (75%) for the Company through an amended CEA. This First Amendment authorizes and directs an amendment to the Credit Enhancement Agreement be executed to reflect this description. The District will expire on March 30, 2031. Please see Exhibit B for a projection of increased assessed values and tax shifts for the District.

The percentage of TIF revenues not obligated to be paid to the Company pursuant to the Credit Enhancement Agreement for each year will be deposited into the City's Project Cost Subaccount of the Development Program Fund for the District and will be used for various municipal economic development endeavors outlined in the original Development Program attached hereto as Exhibit A.

III. Approval Process for First Amendment

A. Notice of Public Hearing

Attached as <u>Exhibit C</u> is a copy of the Notice of Public Hearing published in the *Sun Journal*, a newspaper of general circulation in the City, a date at least ten (10) days prior to the public hearing on the First Amendment. The public hearing on the First Amendment was held on February 22, 2022, in accordance with the requirements of 30-A M.R.S.A. § 5226(1).

B. Minutes of Public Hearing

Attached as <u>Exhibit D</u>, is a certified copy of the minutes of the public hearing held on February 22, 2022, at which time the proposed First Amendment was discussed by the public.

Data sources include the 2021-2022 mil rate/commitment reported by the City, Androscoggin County's FY2022 Budget reflecting Tax Allocation, the State Treasurer's Office Municipal Revenue Sharing projections for FY2022, published 07/02/2021, and the Maine Department of Education 01/18/22 2022-2023 ED 279 form for Auburn Schools. Based on these projections, the City of Auburn loses apprroximately 44 cents out of every new tax dollar to subsidy losses and increased County taxes.
- 2. Tax shift losses are comprised of declining subsidies in revenue sharing and increasing obligations to pay county taxes. Tax shift losses occur a couple of years following the year in which the new assessed value is first recognized in the assessment. No tax shift losses occur when a TIF captures all of the new value.
- 3. These projections assume that the formulas and general inputs for state subsidies and county taxes do not change over time and they assume that all other values in other communities are static relative to one another except for the new value assessed. The projections are less likely to be accurate farther into the future.
- 4. Assumes the assessment ratio in the City is 100% when new property value arrives, such that the market value of new property is used for assessment purposes.
- 5. The projections above assume that no tax increment financing district is put in place, thus the mil rate is reduced by the influx of new value in the City. This analysis factors in tax shift impacts resulting from the project's new assessed value into future commitments and mil rate calculations to arrive at projected property tax payments.

WHEREAS, the City of Auburn (the "City") is authorized pursuant to Chapter 206 of Title 30-A of the Maine Revised Statutes, as amended, to designate specific areas within the City as the Tambrands II Tax Increment Financing District (the "District") and to adopt a development program for the District (the "Development Program"); and

WHEREAS, on November 6, 2000 the Auburn City Council designated the District and adopted a Development Program for the District (the "Original Development Program"), which received the approval from the Maine Department of Economic and Community Development (the "Department"); and

WHEREAS, the City desires to adopt the First Amendment to the District and Development Program (the "First Amendment") to continue to achieve the District's original goals by revising the percentage of taxes paid on captured assessed value allocated to Tambrands Inc. ("the Company") in the Credit Enhancement Agreement; and

WHEREAS, the City Council has held a public hearing on February 22, 2022, upon at least ten (10) days prior notice published in a newspaper of general circulation within the City, on the question of amending the Original Development Program and Credit Enhancement Agreement in accordance with the requirements of 30-A M.R.S.A. § 5226; and

WHEREAS, the City Council has considered the comments provided at the public hearing, both for and against the adoption of the First Amendment, if any; and

WHEREAS, it is expected that approval will be sought and obtained from the Department, approving the First Amendment; and

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF AUBURN, MAINE:

Section 1 The proposed First Amendment will contribute to the economic growth or well-being of the City or to the betterment of the health, welfare or safety of the inhabitants of the City. Pursuant to Title 30-A M.R.S.A. Section 5226(5), this First Amendment does not result in the District being out of compliance with any of the conditions of 30-A M.R.S.A. Section 5223(3) which include the percentage of area the District that is suitable for commercial use or other allowable uses, the acreage caps for single TIF districts and for all TIF districts in the City, and the total TIF district valuation cap. The City Council has considered any evidence presented regarding potential substantial detriments to a party's existing business and determined that any adverse economic effect of the proposed First Amendment on a party's existing business is outweighed by the contribution made by the First Amendment to the economic growth or well-being of the City or to the betterment of the health, welfare or safety of the inhabitants of the City.

Section 2 Pursuant to Chapter 206 of Title 30-A of the Maine Revised Statutes, as amended, the City Council hereby amends the Tambrands II Municipal Development Tax Increment Financing Development Program and adopts the First Amendment, all as more particularly described in the First Amendment presented to the

City Council herewith. Such First Amendment is hereby incorporated by reference into this vote as the Development Program for the District.

<u>Section 3.</u> The City Manager, or his duly appointed representative, is hereby authorized, empowered and directed to submit the proposed First Amendment to the Department for review and approval pursuant to the requirements of 30-A M.R.S.A. § 5226(2). In addition, the City Manager, or his duly appointed representative is hereby authorized, empowered, and directed to execute the amended Credit Enhancement Agreement on terms that are consistent with the First Amendment.

<u>Section 4.</u> The foregoing adoption of the First Amendment shall automatically become final and shall take full force and effect upon receipt by the City of approval of adoption of the First Amendment by the Department, without requirement of any further action by the City, the City Council, or any other party.

<u>Section 5.</u> The City Manager, or his duly appointed representative, is hereby authorized and empowered, at his discretion, from time to time, to make such revisions to the documents adopting the First Amendment as he may deem reasonably necessary or convenient in order to facilitate the process for review and approval of the First Amendment by the Department, so long as such revisions are not inconsistent with these resolutions or the basic structure and intent of the Council in adopting the First Amendment.

The Maine Department of Economic and Community Development ("the department") has reviewed and conditionally approved the City of Auburn's application to create the Procter & Gamble (Tambrands II) Municipal Development Tax Increment Financing District ("the district"). The district takes effect today and is designated for a period of thirty (30) years. Approval is subject to the following provision: should Tambrands or any other employer in this district receive TIF payments that exceed \$10,000 in a calendar year, they must submit an annual written report no later than August 1st of the following year, in accordance with 5 MRSA \$13070-J(3).

The City of Auburn is authorized to use the tax increment arising from captured value expressly for the credit enhancement agreement components defined in the development program. The department is withholding approval of all other economic development projects and public improvements identified in the proposal pending receipt of further information from the City regarding these projects. Any changes to the approved development program require an amendment that is adopted in the same manner as the initial designation, and approved by the department.

In the event that tax increment revenues derived from the district are deposited into the City's general fund, or spent on unapproved projects, the incremental property values generating those revenues must be included with the City's equalized assessed value, and therefore not subject to capture.

The total equalized value of taxable property within the District as of April 1, 2000 together with the equalized value of taxable property in other existing districts measured as of the April I preceding the designation of each such district, does not exceed five percent (5 %) of the total equalized value of taxable property within the City as of the date hereof, and
- d. The aggregate value of municipal indebtedness financed by the proceeds from tax increment financing districts within Androscoggin County, including the proposed District, does not exceed \$50 million: and
- e. The designation of the District and pursuit of the Development Program willgenerate substantial economic benefits for the City and its residents, including employment opportunities, broadened and improved tax base and economic stimulus, and therefore constitutes a good and valid public purpose.
- f. The proposed District and Development Program will make a contribution to the economic growth or well-being of the City. The Public Improvements contemplated by the Development Program will enable the City to improve its economic climate and construct improvements and other collateral economic inducements to attract new businesses to the City.
- **Section 2.** Pursuant to Chapter 207 of Title 30-A of the Maine Revised Statutes, as amended, the City hereby designates the Proctor & Gamble Co. Municipal Development and Tax increment Financing District #7, designated and described as more particularly set forth in the "Tambrands, Inc. Municipal Development and Tax Increment Financing District (#6) Development Program" presented to the City Council in the form attached hereto and such Development Program is hereby incorporated by reference into this vote as the Development Program for the District.

Section 3. Pursuant to the provisions of 30-A M.R.S.A. § 5254, the percentage of captured assessed value to be retained in accordance with the Development Program is hereby established as set forth in the Development Program.

Section 4. The City Manager be, and hereby is, authorized, empowered and directed to submit the proposed designation of the District and the proposed Development Program for the District to the State of Maine Department of Economic and Community Development for review and approval pursuant to the requirements of 30-A M.R.S.A. § 5253(I)(F).

Section 5. The City Manager be and hereby is authorized and empowered, at her discretion, from time to time, to make such technical revisions to the Development Program for the District as may be reasonably necessary or convenient in order to facilitate the process for review and approval of the District by the Department of Economic and Community Development, or for any other reason, so long as such revisions are not inconsistent with these resolutions or the basic structure and intent of the Development Program.

Section 6. The foregoing designation of the District and the adoption of the Development Program for the District shall automatically become final and shall take full force and effect upon receipt by the City of approval of the designation of the District in adoption of the Development Program by the Department of Economic and Community Development, without requirements of further action by the City, the City Council, or any other party.

Section 7. The City Manager be and hereby is authorized and directed to enter into the Credit Enhancement Agreement contemplated by the Development Program, and in the name of and on behalf of the City, such agreement to be in such form and to contain such terms and provisions, not inconsistent with the Development Program, as the City Manager may approve, such approval to be conclusively evidenced by such execution thereof.

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ARTICLE I

Development Program Narrative

Section 1.01. Introduction

a. General Description of the District

The City of Auburn desires to attract and retain quality jobs and commercial development, to create and maintain a healthy tax base, to improve the economy of the City and the State of Maine and to provide for construction of new public infrastruture and improvements to facilitate economic development. In order to fulfill these goals, the following property is being designated as the Tambrands, Inc. Municipal Development and Tax Increment Financing District #6: An area consisting of approximately 84 acres, comprising a portion of the following City of Auburn parcels as described below.

The property which is located at and is bounded on the North by Kittyhawk Avenue, on the east by Hotel Road, and on the south by the Saint Lawrence and Atlantic Railroad tracks, has been preliminarily designated as the Tambrands, Inc. Municipal Development and Tax Increment Financing District #6 (the "District") by the City of Auburn, Maine (the "City"). The Property consists of a portion of Auburn Tax Map No. 2A, Lot 18A, 2A-18B and 2A-113 which is owned by Tambrands, Inc. (the "Company"). A plan depicting the District is attached as **Exhibit A**. The property outlined in black is specifically excluded from the District. The Development Program described herein is proposed for the purpose of administering the District as a municipal development and tax increment financing district pursuant to Chapter 207 of Title 30-A of the Maine Revised Statutes, as amended (the "Development Program"). Upon resolution of the Auburn City Council designating the District and adopting this Development Program, the designation of the District and adoption of the Development Program will immediately become final subject only to approval by the Maine Department of Economic and Community Development ("DECD").

The purpose of the District is (a) to assist the Company with the acquisition and installation of certain machinery and equipment and the development of additional research and manufacturing facilities within the District; (b) to finance costs associated with certain public improvements within the District consisting of infrastructure improvements, including, but not limited to, roadways, access roadways, water, sewer, storm drains, road junctions, sidewalks and landscaping ("Public District Improvements") and (c) to finance costs associated with certain economic development and infrastructure improvements within the City (the "Public Improvements") as hereinafter identified.

b. The Company Project

As described above, the District contemplates both Public Improvements and development by the Company. One purpose of the District is to assist the Company in financing the acquisition and installation of manufacturing machinery and equipment in the District (the "Project"). The Project is ongoing and the full extent of the Project has not yet been decided. At a minimum the Project is currently expected to allow for a

major expansion of the Company's manufacturing capacity through a substantial addition of machinery and equipment.

For purposes of this Development Program and for purposes of calculating captured assessed value, all additions by the Company to its manufacturing machinery and equipment and related assets after April 1, 2000 and all additions and new plants and facilities constructed after April 1, 2000 at its complex in Auburn, shall be deemed to be in the District on April 1st of each subsequent year until disposed of or moved away from the complex.

During the term of the Development Program the City will capture 100% of the increase in the assessed value in the District, and will retain 60% of the retained tax increment revenues from the District for its own use to finance some or all of the estimated cost of public improvements. The City will allocate the remaining balance of the retained tax increment revenues from the District to the Company pursuant to a Credit Enhancement Agreement between the City and the Company (the "Credit Enhancement Agreement") provided that the total amount paid to the Company in any year shall not exceed 40% of the tax increment of that year, and the aggregate amount paid under the Development Program may not exceed total project costs incurred by the Company during the term of the Development Program.

These tax increment revenues will be used by the Company either to pay a portion of the capital costs of the Project directly or to assist in paying debt service on monies borrowed by the Company to finance the cost of the Project. The cost so financed will represent only a portion of the Company's Project costs. All additional costs will be the sole responsibility of the Company. (See Section 1.05 "Uses of Private Property" and Section 2.03 "Indebtedness" herein).

c. Public Improvements

In addition to the Company's Project in the District, the City will use the captured tax increment revenues from the District to finance some or all of the costs of the following types of projects (being the Public Improvements and Public District Improvements): (i) to fund the infrastructure improvements within and abutting the District, including, but not limited to, roadways, access roads, junctions, traffic signals, sewer, water, storm drains, sidewalks and landscaping (hereinafter called the Public District Improvements) (ii) to develop new employment opportunities in the City and to pay other Project Costs as described in 30-A MRSA §5252(8)(B)(11); (iii) to provide for costs reasonably related to the construction, alteration or expansion of facilities not located within the district that are required due to improvements or activities within the District as described in 30-A MRSA §5252(8)(B)(9), including road, water, sewer, stormwater and environmental protection improvements and fire and public safety projects; (iv) to fund the City's economic development programs including, but not limited to, the implementation of the Auburn Downtown Action Plan For Tomorrow being the City's downtown revitalization program; (iv) to fund environmental improvement programs; and (v) to fund infrastructure improvements, and other Project Costs, all as permitted under 30-A M.R.S.A. § 5252(8)(B)(herein collectively called the "Project Costs"). The Public Improvements are further described in Section 1.04 hereof. The City Council finds that each of the specific projects described herein will either directly

or indirectly provide or encourage new employment opportunities within the City, encourage and promote economic development that will broaden the City's tax base, and improve the general economy of the City.

The estimated costs of the projects which may be included as part of the Development Program are identified in **Exhibit B** attached hereto. The specific public improvement projects to be financed with the City's portion of the tax increment financing revenues will be approved through subsequent City Council action pursuant to the City's Charter.

The Project and all associated improvements acquired or financed under this Development Program other than the Public Improvements and other Project Costs will be located within the District. The proposed District will encompass approximately 91 acres and will be located on the premises of the Company's manufacturing facility and complex in Auburn, Maine.

Section 1.02. Statement of Means and Objectives.

a. Development District

The Company constantly searches for ways to improve its operations in order to remain competitive and to service its markets. The Project represents an investment in the Company's future and is intended to increase the Company's capabilities and is a necessary component of the capital investment needed to ensure adequate capacity and a top-quality product. The Project continues the Company's long-standing goal of capital investment with the goal of long-term benefits. The Company plans to undertake this Development Program in order to improve its manufacturing efficiency, capabilities, and working environment.

The Company's investment will create additional tax base within the City and help retain employment within the region and will upgrade necessary production equipment to ensure the continued long-term success of the Company in the City. The Project will also assist the Company in expanding its production capabilities by adding incremental production capacity, enhancing cost competitiveness, and enabling it to sustain its operations in Auburn. See Section 1.05 Uses of Private Property.

In summary, the means and objectives of the District are to finance certain Public Improvements intended to promote economic development and expand the tax base of the City for the benefit of the citizens of the City and to assist the Company in the continuing improvement and modernization of its manufacturing facility and complex. The City recognizes that the Company competes in an increasingly competitive market. The City's assistance provided through the Development Program is intended to help the Company to become more cost competitive and to modernize its operations. To the extent the City can assist the Company in its objective of keeping the Tambrands facility cost competitive, the following public benefit results:

Increased property tax base;

b. Creation of an environment that will encourage future investment by the Company at its Auburn facility;

- C. Retained employment;
- d. Increased flow of revenues to the state and local area; and
- e. Increased consumption of goods and services in the Auburn, Maine area.

Section 1.03. Brief Discussion of Financial Plan

The financial plan for the District is set forth in greater detail in Article II below. The following is a brief summary of the plan. The anticipated investment in the District is initially \$5,000,000, with similar investments occurring annually for at least the next 5 years.

The Project has already started and following DECD approval, completion of the Project will be phased in over the life of the Development Program. As part of the Development Program, the Company is requesting that the City assist it with the Project (i) by capturing one hundred percent (100%) of the increase in assessed value in the District and (ii) by entering into the Credit Enhancement Agreement with the Company pursuant to which the City will retain sixty percent (60%) of the retained captured municipal tax increment, to finance some or all of the Public Improvements, and make available to the Company the balance of the retained captured municipal tax increment revenues on the captured assessed value of the District to assist the Company in financing a portion of the Project. The Development Program will remain in effect for a period of thirty (30) years. The revenues allocated to the Company will be used by the Company either to assist it in paying debt service related to financing the Project or as direct payments toward a portion of the cost of the Project.

Section 1.04. Description of Public Facilities to be Constructed

The City's existing infrastructure is anticipated to be adequate to service the Project, so no public sewer, water, transportation or other infrastructure facilities must be constructed in connection with the Project, although certain street improvements including traffic signals at strategic locations may be undertaken in the future. Other Public Improvements will be completed to assist the City in its efforts to increase employment and economic development in general and specifically to implement the Auburn Downtown Action Plan For Tomorrow being the City's downtown revitalization Program. These improvements will be approved by the City Council on an as needed basis as the various projects are considered and implemented.

Section 1.05. Uses of Private Property

The Project involves the acquisition and/or construction by the Company of approximately \$5,000,000 of new machinery and equipment and the expansion of its manufacturing facility per year for five years within the District and to fund certain feasibility studies with respect to proposed construction of a new research and manufacturing facility at the Company's complex and the development of new product lines. Some of the machinery and equipment will be located in the Tambrands, Inc. Development and Tax Increment Financing District Development Program District dated March 6, 1998 and approved by the Maine Department of Economic Community Development effective March 27, 1998. The acquisition and installation of all improvements will be supervised by the Company and will be subject to all required

state and local approvals. All capital improvements related to the Project will be located in the District except for certain machinery and equipment which will be located in Tambrands, Inc. Development and Tax Increment Financing District accepted by the Maine Department of Economic and Community Development on March 27, 1998. The actual and proposed use of the District is in keeping with current zoning requirements, as manufacturing facilities are a permitted use in the zone in which the District is located.

Section 1.06. Relocation of Displaced Persons

Not applicable.

Section 1.07. Proposed Regulations and Facilities to Improve Transportation

The Project, as it is currently proposed, will not affect vehicular and pedestrian transportation. Existing transportation facilities are adequate to accommodate the Project.

Section 1.08. Environmental Controls

The improvements contemplated by the capital improvement program will comply with all requirements of the City's ordinances, including its Zoning Ordinance. With the exception of (i) any building, site plan and other construction permits to be applied for in the ordinary course, and (ii) any occupancy permits, no further zoning permits, licenses or other local approvals are anticipated to be necessary in connection with the improvements.

The Company will take all steps required by the Maine Department of Environmental Protection ("DEP") in order to ensure that the acquisition, installation, construction and operation of the improvements complies with all state environmental rules and regulations. All air emission, waste water discharge or other licenses required in connection with the Project either have been, or will be, applied for and obtained by the Company as required by applicable law, rule and regulation.

Section 1.09. Plan of Operation Upon Completion

The improvements in the District will at all times be owned by the Company, its successors or assigns, which will be responsible for payment of all maintenance expenses, insurance and taxes on said improvements. During the life of the District, the City Manager or the Manager's designee will be responsible for all administrative matters concerning the implementation and operation of the District. The Company shall be solely responsible for implementation of the Project in the District.

Section 1.10. Program Duration

The duration of the District will begin on the designation of the District and the effective date of its approval by the Maine Department of Economic and Community Development and end on the earlier of 30 years thereafter or payment of all Project costs.

ARTICLE II

Financial Plan

Section 2.01. General Characteristics

The proposed tax increment financing district will encompass approximately 84 acres of taxable property with a total value of land and buildings as of April 1, 2000, in the amount of \$520,900.

This Development Program requires the establishment of a Development Program Fund consisting of a Project Cost Account (with a Tambrands Project Cost subaccount and a Public Improvement Project Cost subaccount) pledged to and charged with payment of project costs and a Development Program Sinking Fund Account to pay debt service on any debt financed Project costs.

Section 2.02. Cost Estimates for Development Program

The estimated initial cost of the Company's Project under the Development Program is approximately \$5,000,000 per year for five years.

Section 2.03. Indebtedness

None of the costs of the Project will be financed through issuance of any municipal indebtedness. If the Company incurs indebtedness with respect to the Project, revenues in the Tambrands Project Cost subaccount in the Project Cost Account of the Development Program Fund established hereunder, which shall consist of the Company's allocable share of tax increment revenues on the retained captured assessed values of the District and any earnings thereon, may be applied to such indebtedness.

Section 2.04. Sources of Anticipated Revenues

The sources of anticipated revenues generated by the District and to be used to pay the Company under the Credit Enhancement Agreement are (i) municipal tax increment revenues on retained captured assessed values, which will be deposited as received into the Tambrands Project Cost subaccount in the Project Cost Account of the District's Development Program Fund, and (ii) earnings on such amounts. The Company will be responsible for making all arrangements for and payments with respect to all additional monies needed to fund the Project.

Separate subaccounts in the Project Cost Account shall be established for the Public Improvements and the Project. Upon receipt of each payment of property tax by the Company, the City shall, within fifteen (15) days, (a) deposit that portion of each payment of property tax allocated for Public Improvements into the public improvement subaccount; and (b) deposit that portion of each payment of property tax allocated to the Project to the project cost subaccount. The municipal tax increment revenues projected to be paid to the Company under the Credit Enhancement Agreement for 30 years are reflected in Table No. I below.

ARTICLE III

The District is the 84 acre parcel comprised of the Company's facility and complex located in Auburn, Maine. The District is delineated on **Exhibit A** hereto.

Section 3.02. Site Location Map

Set forth on **Exhibit A** is a tax map of the City reflecting the approximate location of the District within the City.

ARTICLE IV

Municipal Approvals

Section 4.01. Public Hearing

Attached hereto as **Exhibit H** is a copy of the Notice of Public Hearing held in accordance with the requirements of 30-A M.R.S.A. §5253. The Notice was published in the *Lewiston Sun* Journal, a newspaper of general circulation in Auburn on October 23,2000, a date at least ten (10) days prior to the public hearing. A public hearing was held at a City Council Meeting on November 6, 2000.

Section 4.02. Authorizing Votes

Attached as **Exhibit I** is a copy of the votes adopted at a City Council Meeting of the City of Auburn at a meeting thereof duly called and held on November 6, 2000 preliminarily designating the District and adopting the Development Program.

ARTICLE V

Agreement Regarding Valuation Issues

- a. There are certain assumptions regarding valuation and depreciation of assets, which underlie the analysis set forth in this Development Program. The City and the Company both covenant and agree that the assumptions, analysis and results set forth in this Development Program shall in no way prejudice the rights of either party or be used, in any way, by either party in either presenting evidence or making argument in any dispute which may arise in connection with valuation of the property within the District.
- b. In the event of a revaluation of property within the City during the term of the District, the City and the Company agree that they will enter into good faith negotiations to amend the Credit Enhancement Agreement so that the Company and the City receive the benefits contemplated by this Development Program.

EXHIBIT G

Tax Increment Financing Tax Shift Formulas

A tax increment financing district will result in certain tax shifts which result because the retained captured assessed value of the District will be excluded from the State Valuation of the property in the City. These tax shifts are noted in three basis formulae which use local property tax valuation as a basis for calculation. These three formulas are: (1) State Aid to Education; (2) Municipal Share of County Taxes; and (3) Revenue Sharing to the extent applicable. The following is the process used to derive each of these tax shifts.

Education Tax Shift: Computed by comparing State Department of Education Form ED 261 for the City with and without retained CAV, but not taking into account the hold harmless or hardship cushion that restores in additional State aid to education to the prior years level even through the calculation would have resulted in a reduction.

County Tax Shift: In order to compute this shift, we first obtained the most recent County State Valuation from the State Bureau of Taxation. We then determined the average Captured Assessed Value for the District over the life of the District. We then determined the City's current share of the County Tax by dividing the current City Valuation by the Current County Valuation. We then determined what the City's Share of the County Tax would be if the new value from the District were added by the City's Valuation without the creation of the District by dividing the sum of the current City Valuation plus the average new value by the sum of the current County Valuation plus the average new value. The difference is the factor representing the percentage of the County Tax Shift. Next, we determined the estimated average annual county tax over the life of the District. To arrive at this number, the average change in County Tax for the last five years was determined and the percentage increase projected to the middle of the district's life. This projected tax was then multiplied by the factor developed above to determine the County Tax Shift.

Revenue Sharing Shifts: The first step in determining the Revenue Sharing Tax Shifts was to obtain the total Municipal Revenue Sharing Amount from the State Treasurer. The five steps outlined in the following formula were then applied:

Step One: Municipal Population X Local Property Tax Levied = Current Factor

State Local Valuation

Step Two: Municipal Population X Local Property Tax Levied = Adjusted Factor

State Local Valuation + Captured Assessed Value

Step Three: <u>Current Factor = 1.X</u>

Adjusted Factor

Step Four: 1.X - 1.0 = .X

Step Five: .X (Total Municipal Revenue Sharing Amount) = Revenue Sharing Shift The relevant computations are attached.

City Council Order

Amending the #6 Proctor & Gamble (Tambrands II) Municipal Development Tax Increment Financing Development Program

WHEREAS, the City of Auburn (the "City") is authorized pursuant to Chapter 206 of Title 30-A of the Maine Revised Statutes, as amended, to designate specific areas within the City as the Tambrands II Tax Increment Financing District (the "District") and to adopt a development program for the District (the "Development Program"); and

WHEREAS, on November 6, 2000 the Auburn City Council designated the District and adopted a Development Program for the District (the "Original Development Program"), which received the approval from the Maine Department of Economic and Community Development (the "Department"); and

WHEREAS, the City desires to adopt the First Amendment to the District and Development Program (the "First Amendment") to continue to achieve the District's original goals by revising the percentage of taxes paid on captured assessed value allocated to Tambrands Inc. ("the Company") in the Credit Enhancement Agreement; and

WHEREAS, the City Council has held a public hearing on February 21, 2022, upon at least ten (10) days prior notice published in a newspaper of general circulation within the City, on the question of amending the Original Development Program and Credit Enhancement Agreement in accordance with the requirements of 30-A M.R.S.A. § 5226; and

WHEREAS, the City Council has considered the comments provided at the public hearing, both for and against the adoption of the First Amendment, if any; and

WHEREAS, it is expected that approval will be sought and obtained from the Department, approving the First Amendment; and

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF AUBURN, MAINE:

Section 1. The proposed First Amendment will contribute to the economic growth or well-being of the City or to the betterment of the health, welfare or safety of the inhabitants of the City. Pursuant to Title 30-A M.R.S.A. Section 5226(5), this First Amendment does not result in the District being out of compliance with any of the conditions of 30-A M.R.S.A. Section 5223(3) which include the percentage of area the District that is suitable for commercial use or other allowable uses, the acreage caps for single TIF districts and for all TIF districts in the City, and the total TIF district valuation cap. The City Council has considered any evidence presented regarding potential substantial detriments to a party's existing business and determined that any adverse economic



effect of the proposed First Amendment on a party's existing business is outweighed by the contribution made by the First Amendment to the economic growth or well-being of the City or to the betterment of the health, welfare or safety of the inhabitants of the City.

<u>Section 2.</u> Pursuant to Chapter 206 of Title 30-A of the Maine Revised Statutes, as amended, the City Council hereby amends the Tambrands II Municipal Development Tax Increment Financing Development Program and adopts the First Amendment, all as more particularly described in the First Amendment presented to the City Council herewith. Such First Amendment is hereby incorporated by reference into this vote as the Development Program for the District.

<u>Section 3.</u> The City Manager, or his duly appointed representative, is hereby authorized, empowered and directed to submit the proposed First Amendment to the Department for review and approval pursuant to the requirements of 30-A M.R.S.A. § 5226(2). In addition, the City Manager, or his duly appointed representative is hereby authorized, empowered, and directed to execute the amended Credit Enhancement Agreement on terms that are consistent with the First Amendment.

<u>Section 4.</u> The foregoing adoption of the First Amendment shall automatically become final and shall take full force and effect upon receipt by the City of approval of adoption of the First Amendment by the Department, without requirement of any further action by the City, the City Council, or any other party.

<u>Section 5.</u> The City Manager, or his duly appointed representative, is hereby authorized and empowered, at his discretion, from time to time, to make such revisions to the documents adopting the First Amendment as he may deem reasonably necessary or convenient in order to facilitate the process for review and approval of the First Amendment by the Department, so long as such revisions are not inconsistent with these resolutions or the basic structure and intent of the Council in adopting the First Amendment.

PUBLIC SAFETY, DETENTION AND CORRECTIONAL FACILITY MORATORIUM ORDINANCE

THE CITY OF AUBURN adopts a Public Safety, Detention, and Correctional Facility Moratorium Ordinance as follows:

WHEREAS, the Androscoggin County Commissioners have announced plans to acquire property within the City to be used as a new or additional location for offices of the Androscoggin County Sheriff's Department and as a new or additional location for the Androscoggin County Jail;

WHEREAS, the current offices of the Androscoggin County Sheriff and the current Androscoggin County Jail are used for law enforcement, communications, emergency management, special operations, investigations, civil service, detention, including the holding and housing of persons in custody under process of law pending the outcome of legal proceedings, and corrections, including the holding and housing of persons for the purposes of punishment, correction, or rehabilitation following conviction of a criminal offense;

WHEREAS, the City's current ordinances governing land use, zoning, site plan review and special exception review do not adequately or specifically address Public Safety Facilities, Detention Facilities or Correctional Facilities;

WHEREAS, development of new or additional Public Safety Facilities, Detention Facilities or Correctional Facilities could pose serious threats to the public health, safety and welfare of the residents and businesses abutting or in close proximity to such facilities without adequate provision for issues of public safety, health, land use compatibility, noise, visual degradation and environmental degradation;

WHEREAS, the City is in the process of reviewing its Code of Ordinances, and needs additional time to study its Code of Ordinances to determine the implications of development proposals involving Public Safety Facilities, Detention Facilities and Correctional Facilities;

WHEREAS, the City Council and the Planning Board, with such professional advice and assistance as they deem necessary and appropriate, shall study the City's ordinances to determine the public safety, health, land use, environmental and other regulatory implications of development proposals involving Public Safety Facilities, Detention Facilities and Correctional Facilities and consider what regulations might be appropriate for such activity;

WHEREAS, the City's current ordinances are not adequate to prevent serious public harm from proposed development proposals involving Public Safely Facilities, Detention



Facilities and Correctional Facilities;

WHEREAS, the City's current ordinances do not contain sufficient standards to effectively provide municipal review and approval of development proposals involving Public Safety Facilities, Detention Facilities and Correctional Facilities;

WHEREAS, it is anticipated that such a study, review, and development of recommended ordinance changes will take at least one hundred and eighty (180) days from the date the City considers this moratorium on development proposals involving Public Safety Facilities, Detention Facilities, and Correctional Facilities;

WHEREAS, amendments to ordinances may require public hearings by the Planning Board and City Council and votes by the Planning Board and City Council; and

WHEREAS, in the judgment of the City, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of 30-A M.R.S.A. § 4356(1), and require this Ordinance as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public health, safety and welfare;

NOW, THEREFORE, the City does hereby ordain that the following Moratorium Ordinance be, and hereby is, enacted:

Section 1. Moratorium Declared.

The City does hereby declare a moratorium on development proposals involving Public Safety Facilities, Detention Facilities, or Correctional Facilities at a site on which one currently does not exist. The moratorium shall remain in effect for one hundred and eighty (180) days from the date of applicability of this Ordinance, unless extended or modified by the City Council, for the express purpose of drafting an amendment or amendments to City ordinances to protect the public from health and safety risks including, but not limited to, the potential adverse public safety, health. land use compatibility, noise, environmental degradation and visual degradation effects of development proposals involving a Public Safety Facility, Detention Facility or Correctional Facility if not properly regulated; and

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that notwithstanding the provisions of 1 M.R.S.A. § 302 or any other law to the contrary, this Ordinance, when enacted, shall apply to any development proposals involving a Public Safety Facility, Detention Facility, or Correctional Facility for which an application for site plan review has not been determined to be complete by vote of the Planning Board prior to February 22, 2022, which is the applicability date of this Ordinance; and

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that no person or organization shall start or engage in the construction or operation of a Public Safety Facility, Detention Facility, or Correctional Facility for which an application for site plan review has not been determined to be complete by vote of the



Planning Board prior to February 22, 2022, without complying with whatever ordinance amendment or amendments the City may enact as a result of this moratorium; and

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that during the time this moratorium is in effect, no officer, official, employee, office, administrative board or agency of the City shall accept, process, approve, deny, or in any other way act upon any application for a license, building permit, certificate of approved use, conditional use review, special exception review and/or any other permits, licenses or approvals related to a Public Safety Facility, Detention Facility, or Correctional Facility for which an application for site plan review has not been determined to be complete by vote of the Planning Board prior to February 22, 2022; and

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that those provisions of the City's ordinances that are inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this Ordinance, are hereby repealed to the extent that they are applicable for the duration of the moratorium hereby ordained, and as it may be extended as permitted by law, but not otherwise; and

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that should any section or provision of this Ordinance be declared by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, such a declaration shall not invalidate any other section or provision.

Section 2. Violations; Civil Penalties.

If the construction or operation of a Public Safety Facility, Detention Facility, or Correctional Facility is initiated in violation of this Ordinance, each day of any continuing violation shall constitute a separate violation of this Ordinance, and the City shall be entitled to all rights available to it in law and equity, including, but not limited to, fines and penalties in accordance with 30-A M.R.S.A. § 4452 or City ordinance, injunctive relief, and its reasonable attorney's fees and costs in prosecuting any such violations.

Section 3. Definitions.

Correctional Facility means a facility in which persons are held and housed primarily for the purposes of punishment, correction, or rehabilitation following conviction of a criminal offense. This definition includes pre-release facilities, but does not include work release centers.

City means the City of Auburn, Maine, a municipal corporation organized and existing under the laws of the State of Maine.

Detention Facility means a facility in which persons are held and housed in custody under process of law, pending the outcome of legal proceedings, but not for the purposes of punishment, correction, or rehabilitation following conviction of a criminal offense.



Public Safety Facility means a facility in which the operations of law enforcement, communications, fire services, emergency management, special operations, investigations, or civil services are housed for emergency and public safety responses.

Section 4. Effective Date; Emergency Declaration

The City Council declares the existence of an emergency because the Code of Ordinances is insufficient to prevent serious public harm that could be caused by the unregulated development of Public Safety Facilities, Detention Facilities, and Correctional Facilities, thereby necessitating a moratorium to provide an opportunity for the City to review the potential impacts and harm that may be caused by such development, and to amend its Code of Ordinances to mitigate the potential impact and harm on the City, its businesses and its residents. This Ordinance shall be effective immediately upon enactment by the City Council and shall remain in effect for one hundred and eighty (180) days from the date of enactment unless it is adopted as a regular ordinance within that time period.

The following is a discussion regarding the significant variances found in the City's January financial report. Please note that although the monthly financial report contains amounts reported by the School Department, this discussion is limited to the City's financial results and does not attempt to explain any variances for the School Department.

The City has completed its seventh month of the current fiscal year. As a guideline for tracking purposes, revenues and expenditures should amount to approximately 58.3% of the annual budget. However, not all costs and revenues are distributed evenly throughout the year; individual line items can vary based upon cyclical activity.

Revenues

Revenues collected through January 31st, including the school department were \$57,008,701 or 59.73%, of the budget. The municipal revenues including property taxes were \$38,628,892, or 59.29% of the budget which is less than the same period last year by 0.12%. The accounts listed below are noteworthy.

- A. The current year tax revenue is at 57.84% as compared to 58.17% last year. This is a \$59,433 increase over last year. The second payment is due March 15th.
- B. Excise tax for the month of January is at 59.05%. This is a decrease of \$260,546 over FY 21. Our excise revenues for FY22 are 0.75% above projections as of January 31, 2022.
- C. State Revenue Sharing at the end of January is 98.56% or \$3,104,618. This is an increase of \$1,011,942 over last January.

Expenditures

City expenditures through January 2022 were \$31,450,440, or 66.77%, of the budget. This is a decrease of 0.02% less than the same period last year. The percentage of expenditures is lower, but dollars are higher due to the higher budget. Noteworthy variances are:

- A. Administration is higher than last year by 2.52%. The major increases are Communications & Technology and Human Resources budgets being higher than last year.
- B. Public Safety is higher due to both Police and Fire/EMS are higher.
- C. Public Works is higher due to Winter Storm operations and overtime.

Investments

This section contains an investment schedule as of January 31st. Currently the City's funds are earning an average interest rate of 0.15% compared to .58% in 2021.

INGERSOLL TURF FACILITY

Statement of Net Assets:

The Statement of Net Assets lists current assets, noncurrent assets, liabilities and net assets as of January 31, 2022.

Current Assets:

As of the end of January 2022 the total current assets of Ingersoll Turf Facility were \$226,735. This consisted of cash and cash equivalents of \$226,735.

Noncurrent Assets:

Ingersoll's noncurrent assets are the building and equipment that was purchased, less depreciation. The total value of the noncurrent assets as of January 31, 2022, were \$89,514.

Liabilities:

Ingersoll had no accounts payable as of January 31, 2022, and an interfund payable of \$26,583.

Statement of Activities:

The statement of activities shows the current operating revenue collected for the fiscal year and the operating expenses as well as any nonoperating revenue and expenses.

The operating revenues for Ingersoll Turf Facility through January 2022 are \$108,013. This revenue comes from the sponsorships, programs, rental income and batting cages.

The operating expenses for Ingersoll Turf Facility through January 2022 were \$85,185. These expenses include personnel costs, supplies, utilities, repairs, capital purchases and maintenance.

NORWAY SAVINGS BANK ARENA

Statement of Net Assets:

The Statement of Net Assets lists current assets, noncurrent assets, liabilities and net assets and shows a comparison to the previous month, in this case, December 31, 2020.

Current Assets:

As of the end of January 2022 the total current assets of Norway Savings Bank Arena were (\$1,163,208). These consisted of cash and cash equivalents of \$269,729, accounts receivable of \$157,621, and an interfund payable of \$1,590,558.

Noncurrent Assets:

Norway's noncurrent assets are equipment that was purchased, less depreciation (depreciation is posted at year end). The total value of the noncurrent assets as of January 31, 2022, were \$195,258.

Liabilities:

Norway Arena had no accounts payable as of January 31, 2022.

Statement of Activities:

The statement of activities shows the current operating revenue collected for the fiscal year and the operating expenses as well as any nonoperating revenue and expenses.

The operating revenues for Norway Arena through January 2022 are \$606,964. This revenue comes from the concessions, sign advertisements, pro shop lease, youth programming, shinny hockey, public skating and ice rentals.

The operating expenses for Norway Arena through January 2022 were \$339,065. These expenses include personnel costs, supplies, utilities, repairs, capital purchases and maintenance.

As of January 2022, Norway Arena has an operating and net gain of \$267,899.

As of January 31, 2022, Norway Arena has an increase in net assets of \$267,899.

The budget to actual reports for revenue and expenditures, with comparison to the same period last year show that revenue for FY22 is \$271,996 more than in FY21 and expenditures in F22 are \$33,995 less than last year in January.

Subject: Executive Session

Information: Economic development, pursuant to 1 M.R.S.A. Section 405(6) (C).

Executive Session: On occasion, the City Council discusses matters which are required or allowed by State law to be considered in executive session. Executive sessions are not open to the public. The matters that are discussed in executive session are required to be kept confidential until they become a matter of public discussion. In order to go into executive session, a Councilor must make a motion in public. The motion must be recorded, and 3/5 of the members of the Council must vote to go into executive session. An executive session is not required to be scheduled in advance as an agenda item, although when it is known at the time that the agenda is finalized, it will be listed on the agenda. The only topics which may be discussed in executive session are those that fall within one of the categories set forth in Title 1 M.R.S.A. Section 405(6). Those applicable to municipal government are:

- A. Discussion or consideration of the employment, appointment, assignment, duties, promotion, demotion, compensation, evaluation, disciplining, resignation or dismissal of an individual or group of public officials, appointees or employees of the body or agency or the investigation or hearing of charges or complaints against a person or persons subject to the following conditions:
- (1) An executive session may be held only if public discussion could be reasonably expected to cause damage to the individual's reputation or the individual's right to privacy would be violated;
- (2) Any person charged or investigated must be permitted to be present at an executive session if that person so desires;
- (3) Any person charged or investigated may request in writing that the investigation or hearing of charges or complaints against that person be conducted in open session. A request, if made to the agency, must be honored; and
- (4) Any person bringing charges, complaints or allegations of misconduct against the individual under discussion must be permitted to be present. This paragraph does not apply to discussion of a budget or budget proposal;
- B. Discussion or consideration by a school board of suspension or expulsion of a public school student or a student at a private school, the cost of whose education is paid from public funds, as long as:
- (1) The student and legal counsel and, if the student is a minor, the student's parents or legal guardians are permitted to be present at an executive session if the student, parents or guardians so desire;
- C. Discussion or consideration of the condition, acquisition or the use of real or personal property permanently attached to real property or interests therein or disposition of publicly held property or economic development only if premature disclosures of the information would prejudice the competitive or bargaining position of the body or agency;
- D. Discussion of labor contracts and proposals and meetings between a public agency and its negotiators. The parties must be named before the body or agency may go into executive session. Negotiations between the representatives of a public employer and public employees may be open to the public if both parties agree to conduct negotiations in open sessions;
- E. Consultations between a body or agency and its attorney concerning the legal rights and duties of the body or agency, pending or contemplated litigation, settlement offers and matters where the duties of the public body's or agency's counsel to the attorney's client pursuant to the code of professional responsibility clearly conflict with this subchapter or where premature general public knowledge would clearly place the State, municipality or other public agency or person at a substantial disadvantage;
- F. Discussions of information contained in records made, maintained or received by a body or agency when access by the general public to those records is prohibited by statute;
- G. Discussion or approval of the content of examinations administered by a body or agency for licensing, permitting or employment purposes; consultation between a body or agency and any entity that provides examination services to that body or agency regarding the content of an examination; and review of examinations with the person examined; and
- H. Consultations between municipal officers and a code enforcement officer representing the municipality pursuant to Title 30-A, section 4452, subsection 1, paragraph C in the prosecution of an enforcement matter pending in District Court when the consultation relates to that pending enforcement matter.
