Subject: Executive Session

Information: Legal consultation, pursuant to 1 M.R.S.A. Section 405(6) (E).

Executive Session: On occasion, the City Council discusses matters which are required or allowed by State law to be considered in executive session. Executive sessions are not open to the public. The matters that are discussed in executive session are required to be kept confidential until they become a matter of public discussion. In order to go into executive session, a Councilor must make a motion in public. The motion must be recorded, and 3/5 of the members of the Council must vote to go into executive session. An executive session is not required to be scheduled in advance as an agenda item, although when it is known at the time that the agenda is finalized, it will be listed on the agenda. The only topics which may be discussed in executive session are those that fall within one of the categories set forth in Title 1 M.R.S.A. Section 405(6). Those applicable to municipal government are:

- A. Discussion or consideration of the employment, appointment, assignment, duties, promotion, demotion, compensation, evaluation, disciplining, resignation or dismissal of an individual or group of public officials, appointees or employees of the body or agency or the investigation or hearing of charges or complaints against a person or persons subject to the following conditions:
- (1) An executive session may be held only if public discussion could be reasonably expected to cause damage to the individual's reputation or the individual's right to privacy would be violated;
 - (2) Any person charged or investigated must be permitted to be present at an executive session if that person so desires;
- (3) Any person charged or investigated may request in writing that the investigation or hearing of charges or complaints against that person be conducted in open session. A request, if made to the agency, must be honored; and
 - (4) Any person bringing charges, complaints or allegations of misconduct against the individual under discussion must be permitted to be present. This paragraph does not apply to discussion of a budget or budget proposal;
- B. Discussion or consideration by a school board of suspension or expulsion of a public school student or a student at a private school, the cost of whose education is paid from public funds, as long as:
- (1) The student and legal counsel and, if the student is a minor, the student's parents or legal guardians are permitted to be present at an executive session if the student, parents or guardians so desire;
- C. Discussion or consideration of the condition, acquisition or the use of real or personal property permanently attached to real property or interests therein or disposition of publicly held property or economic development only if premature disclosures of the information would prejudice the competitive or bargaining position of the body or agency;
- D. Discussion of labor contracts and proposals and meetings between a public agency and its negotiators. The parties must be named before the body or agency may go into executive session. Negotiations between the representatives of a public employer and public employees may be open to the public if both parties agree to conduct negotiations in open sessions;
- E. POLICY FOR NAMING OF FACILITIES AND INFRASTRUCTURE

Any naming or renaming of public places in Auburn should help to better define and build a sense of community, while also serving to honor the contributions of worthy individuals. The City of Auburn strives to have a process that serves these goals in a way that allows public participation.

The City Council will be the official naming body for all municipally owned facilities and infrastructure. The Council will make recommendations and work collaboratively with other governmental entities in the naming of facilities and infrastructure not solely owned by the City of Auburn.

Although the Council reserves the right to use whatever process they deem most appropriate for the circumstances, in general, the Council will use the following process. Nominations will be accepted for names to any public facility, park, building, or infrastructure. Nominations should include the name and contact information from the person submitting the name as well as the reasons for their nomination.

The criteria for naming a city facility or infrastructure should reflect one or more of the following:

- 1. reflect City services provided in or at facility;
- 2. reflect geographical location;
- 3. reflect significant natural features; or
- 4. honor a significant individual (see below)

Criteria for naming a facility after an individual:

May be named after an individual living or dead;

- a. made a unique contribution to the area being named;
- b. substantially improved or contributed to the quality of life in Auburn;
- c. gave significant civic contribution(s) to Auburn or the region;
- d. brought recognition to Auburn for their achievements;








Information : There is a request to amend the ordinance language in Section 2-454 Established; membership section b for the Parks and Recreation Advisory Board. Current Language reads: "Of the seven appointed members, there shall be no more than two members from the same ward. A member shall forfeit his membership if he becomes a resident of a ward in which two members of the board already reside." The request is to eliminate all of section b. This request is a result from not being able to fill vacant position with eager volunteers from the community due to the ward restrictions Vacant position(s) have not been filled several times in the last two years due to this restriction.

Sec. 2-454. Established; membership.

- (a) There shall be a parks and recreation advisory board, which shall be composed of eight members. All except the ex officio member of the board shall be appointed by the city council.
- (b) Of the seven appointed members, there shall be no more than two members from the same ward. A member shall forfeit his membership if he becomes a resident of a ward in which two members of the board already reside.
- (c) Serving as the ex officio member shall be the director of parks and recreation, who shall also serve as secretary to the board.
- (d) Nothing in this article shall preclude the creation of standing subcommittees.

(Code 1967, § 18-3.1)

Thursday, June 28th the Neighborhood Watch Group will be meeting at the Sixth Street Congregational Church at 6:30 PM, and on Saturday, there will be a yard sale and bottle drive at Rolly's Diner to raise money for the Marshall Popcorn Truck.

The City Council voted to approve a moratorium for Medical Marijuana Social Clubs and Retail Medical Marijuana Storefronts effective May 31, 2018. As a follow-up to the Council's action staff has reviewed the permitting status of known or suspected businesses engaged in business activity that might be affected by the moratorium. The businesses reviewed are limited to those that the City currently believes may be operating as Retail Medical Marijuana Storefronts as defined in the moratorium ordinance. Staff has provided this review for the consideration of the Council. To date, staff has not taken enforcement action on activities uncovered during the review that appear to exceed the allowances under existing permits and/or licenses. Further review will be needed to confirm if facilities suspected of operating as Retail Medical Marijuana Storefronts as defined in the ordinance are conducting business in violation of existing permits and licenses. Staff intends to follow the updates to marijuana related legislation, work with the committee to draft recommended ordinances and take further direction from the Council as it becomes available.

Information: Evergreen Subaru, currently located on Center Street, has been a successful auto dealership and has acquired 2 properties (listed above) that are adjacent and located on Turner St and Niskayuna St. These 2 properties are currently zoned Suburban Residential and are being petitioned to have that zoning changed to General Business. The 2010 Comprehensive Plan Future Land Use Map recommends the area requested for rezoning for Business Expansion Transition (BXT). The BXT land use designation is compatible with the General Business District and complies with the 2010 Comprehensive Plan. I. PROPOSAL- Evergreen Subaru submitted a petition to rezone 2 properties located at 20 Niskayuna St (PID: 300-014) and 1079 Turner St (PID: 300-013). These properties are currently zoned <u>Suburban Residential (SR)</u> and applicant is requesting the zoning be changed to <u>General Business (GB)</u>. The applicant is the owner of the properties that are being requested for rezoning and wants to expand Evergreen Subaru's auto sales into that area. The total net acreage of the 2 properties is 1.22 acres and the gross acreage (include street right of way) is 1.6 acres. The applicant is also requesting the discontinuance of Niskayuna St.

II. DEPARTMENT REVIEW- The Plan Review Committee met on April 18th and the Police Department was curious to know if the taxable value of the lots would increase because of the zone change and the Assessing Department replied that the conversion from residential to commercial is likely to increase the taxable value of each lot, even before a structure were to be put on any of the lots. The Planning Department wanted to make sure the zone change was supported by the Comprehensive Plan's Future Land Use Map and it is.

III. PLANNING BOARD ACTION- The Planning Board reviewed whether the proposed zone change complies with the 2010 Comprehensive Plan's Future Land Use Map.

Current Zoning- The properties located at 20 Niskayuna St (PID: 300-014) and 1079 Turner St (PID: 300-013) are currently zoned Suburban Residential. The properties to the north are zoned Suburban Residential and General Business, to the east is zoned General Business, to the south is General Business and to the west is Suburban Residential. The dealership has secured the option rights to purchase 1079 Turner St and owns the property at 20 Niskayuna St.





IV.PLANNING BOARD PUBLIC HEARING, DELIBERATION AND RECOMMENDATION-

The Planning Board opened the public hearing portion of agenda item at the May 8, 2018 meeting and no one from the public spoke or gave comments. The Planning Board then discussed:

- The status of the surrounding properties understanding that, if approved, the 7-lot property block between Turner St, Malibu Dr, Center St, and Niskayuna would be zoned completely General Business.
- The Board also considered photos of the existing screening that had been grown over time and wanted to make sure steps were taken to protect the remaining residential properties from the commercial property.

- The Board discussed the timing of any future development and how potential impacts on the remaining residential properties would be handled. The applicant would have to apply for a Special Exception and Site Plan Review to the Planning Board where impacts on surrounding properties would be addressed prior to any approval and construction.
- A question was raised as to whether a portion of Niskayuna would remain open as a possible entrance to the dealership, but the applicant indicated that was not likely and that the entrances to the dealership would be only off of Joline Dr. and Malibu Dr.

The Planning Board considered the applicant's testimony and the Staff recommendation of Approval and voted with a favorable and unanimous vote of 5-0 (motion by Bowyer, seconded by Hamlyn) to forward a recommendation of **APPROVAL** to the City Council of the proposed zone change from <u>Suburban Residential</u> to <u>General Business</u> for the properties located at 20 Niskayuna St (PID: 300-014) and 1079 Turner St (PID: 300-013) with the following findings:

- 1. The properties proposed for rezoning meet the definition of Business Expansion Transition District.
- 2. The properties proposed for rezoning are in agreement with the 2010 Comprehensive Plan's Future Land Use Map.

I. **PROPOSAL** – Mike Gotto, of Stoneybrook Consultants, Inc., an agent for Evergreen Subaru has submitted a rezoning petition for properties located at 20 Niskayuna St (PID: 300-014) and 1079 Turner St (PID: 300-013). These properties are currently zoned <u>Suburban Residential (SR)</u> and the applicant is requesting the zoning be changed to <u>General Business (GB)</u>. The applicant is the owner of the properties that are being requested for rezoning and wants to expand their facilities into that area. The total net acreage of the 2 properties is 1.22 acres and the gross acreage (include street right of way) is 1.6 acres.

In July 2016 Evergreen Subaru submitted a rezoning petition to the Planning Board for properties located at 16 Malibu Drive (PID # 301-006), 32 Malibu Drive (PID # 301-007), 40 Malibu Drive (PID # 301-012), and 40 Niskayuna Street (PID # 301-004). At the time, the Planning Board voted with a favorable, unanimous vote of 7-0 to forward a recommendation of approval to the City Council of the proposed zone change from <u>Suburban Residential</u> to <u>General Business</u> for the 4 properties referenced above. The zone change for those 4 properties were approved at the September 12, 2016 City Council meeting. The September 2016 zone change approval of these properties means that only two parcels left - 1079 Turner Street and 20 Niskayuna Street – are in the SR zoning district in the 7-property block between Niskayuna St, Turner St, Center St and Malibu Drive.





Information:

Discussion on a poverty abatement case # 2018-002 pursuant to (36 M.R.S.A § 841). A hearing and written notice needs to be provided within 30 days of the application.

Executive Session: On occasion, the City Council discusses matters which are required or allowed by State law to be considered in executive session. Executive sessions are not open to the public. The matters that are discussed in executive session are required to be kept confidential until they become a matter of public discussion. In order to go into executive session, a Councilor must make a motion in public. The motion must be recorded, and 3/5 of the members of the Council must vote to go into executive session. An executive session is not required to be scheduled in advance as an agenda item, although when it is known at the time that the agenda is finalized, it will be listed on the agenda. The only topics which may be discussed in executive session are those that fall within one of the categories set forth in Title 1 M.R.S.A. Section 405(6). Those applicable to municipal government are:

- A. Discussion or consideration of the employment, appointment, assignment, duties, promotion, demotion, compensation, evaluation, disciplining, resignation or dismissal of an individual or group of public officials, appointees or employees of the body or agency or the investigation or hearing of charges or complaints against a person or persons subject to the following conditions:
 - (1) An executive session may be held only if public discussion could be reasonably expected to cause damage to the individual's reputation or the individual's right to privacy would be violated;
 - (2) Any person charged or investigated must be permitted to be present at an executive session if that person so desires;
 - (3) Any person charged or investigated may request in writing that the investigation or hearing of charges or complaints against that person be conducted in open session. A request, if made to the agency, must be honored; and
 - (4) Any person bringing charges, complaints or allegations of misconduct against the individual under discussion must be permitted to be present.

This paragraph does not apply to discussion of a budget or budget proposal;

- B. Discussion or consideration by a school board of suspension or expulsion of a public school student or a student at a private school, the cost of whose education is paid from public funds, as long as:
 - (1) The student and legal counsel and, if the student is a minor, the student's parents or legal guardians are permitted to be present at an executive session if the student, parents or guardians so desire;
- C. Discussion or consideration of the condition, acquisition or the use of real or personal property permanently attached to real property or interests therein or disposition of publicly held property or economic development only if premature disclosures of the information would prejudice the competitive or bargaining position of the body or agency;
- D. Discussion of labor contracts and proposals and meetings between a public agency and its negotiators. The parties must be named before the body or agency may go into executive session. Negotiations between the representatives of a public employer and public employees may be open to the public if both parties agree to conduct negotiations in open sessions;
- E. Consultations between a body or agency and its attorney concerning the legal rights and duties of the body or agency, pending or contemplated litigation, settlement offers and matters where the duties of the public body's or agency's counsel to the attorney's client pursuant to the code of professional responsibility clearly conflict with this subchapter or where premature general public knowledge would clearly place the State, municipality or other public agency or person at a substantial disadvantage;
- F. Discussions of information contained in records made, maintained or received by a body or agency when access by the general public to those records is prohibited by statute;
- G. Discussion or approval of the content of examinations administered by a body or agency for licensing, permitting or employment purposes; consultation between a body or agency and any entity that provides examination services to that body or agency regarding the content of an examination; and review of examinations with the person examined; and
- H. Consultations between municipal officers and a code enforcement officer representing the municipality pursuant to Title 30-A, section 4452, subsection 1, paragraph C in the prosecution of an enforcement matter pending in District Court when the consultation relates to that pending enforcement matter.
