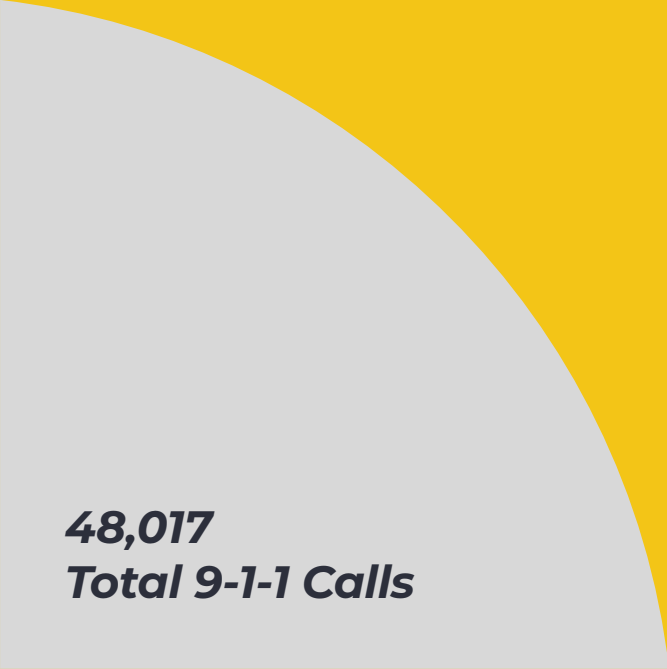

GRANT FUNDING [received from 1/1/2022 through 12/31/2022]

In 2022, the City of Auburn received **\$9,357,855.30** in state, local and federal funding (includes \$6,772,899.50 in ARPA funding).

● TRASH + RECYCLING

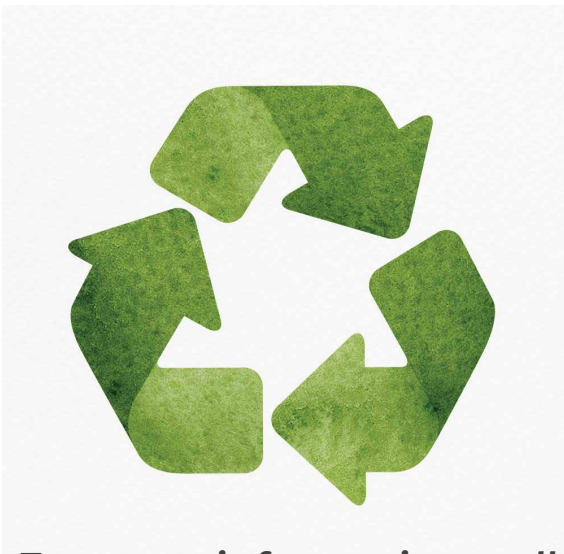
The City of Auburn provides curbside trash and recycling collection Monday through Friday, with occasional exceptions for holidays.

Trash is collected weekly; recycling is collected on the 1st & 3rd week, or 2nd & 4th week, depending on the street you live on.

Please remember to have all trash & recycling curbside no earlier than 6pm the night before or by 7am on collection day. To see when your day is, visit auburnmaine.gov.

● COMPOSTING

Composting food waste is an eco-friendly way of reducing household waste. Composting reduces your trash bag costs and means less waste entering the landfill. It also returns nutrients to the soil.

It's free and easy to participate in the City of Auburn's **Food Waste Composting Program**. Bring your food waste to: Auburn Public Works, 296 Gracelawn or the New Auburn Fire Station, 181 South Main.

Drain as much liquid as possible from food waste before putting in your container. Sprinkle baking soda or rub vinegar on the inside of the container to avoid odors & fruit flies. Consider storing food scraps in the freezer to eliminate odors. If you use a plastic bag to store your food waste, be sure to place the bag in the trash after emptying contents into the compost bin.

Sustainable **AUBURN**

Auburn is committed to becoming a cleaner, greener city. Since 2013, the city has made a conscious effort to apply a “sustainable lens” when making decisions on purchasing, energy consumption and usage, vehicles, infrastructure and much more. Below are a few of the ways we are working toward a cleaner future for Auburn.

Natural Gas

Natural gas systems have now been installed in several major city facilities.

LED Lighting & Street Lights

Lighting within city buildings has been converted to LED. The city also purchased every streetlight from CMP and converted them to LED, and added “smart controls.”

Hydropower

Auburn is one of the first municipalities in Maine to move to hydropower. As much as half of the city’s electrical needs will be met through clean, renewable hydropower, all of it locally generated at Hackett Mills.

AI Solution: “BrainBox”

Auburn Hall’s HVAC system has been enhanced by technology. The AI automatically adjusts for efficiency & comfort, resulting in less usage.



Community Resilience

The city has begun internal evaluation of planning and operations, across departments, in pursuit of membership in the Community Resilience Partnership managed by the state of Maine. 2023 will bring additional public outreach and the adoption of priority action steps to improve sustainability.

Sustainable Auburn Rebates

Energy efficiency is a great way to save energy and money, and often improve comfort, safety, and maintenance costs in the process. Through the Sustainable Auburn Matching Rebate Program, Auburn residents can DOUBLE their Efficiency Maine rebates! In 2022, the city issued **\$191,044** in matching rebates (on **288** more efficient units).

Electric Vehicles & Charging Stations

The city continues to invest in clean, efficient electric vehicles; we currently have 3. The city has installed six electric vehicle charging stations in the Mechanics Row Parking Garage. Staff, together with Auburn’s Sustainability Workgroup have partnered with Bates College student researchers to evaluate the potential for EV investment based on recent state and federal legislation and climate goals. We are now well-positioned to pursue non-local funding to extend charging infrastructure to neighborhoods and key travel corridors.

Communications

Auburn's communications team is dedicated to community and media relations and presents municipal information to the public. Through the city's website, social media presence, paid and earned media, signage, email & text alerts, publications, and many other tools, our team works to positively promote civic engagement and municipal transparency through accurate, consistent and timely information about the City of Auburn. **We are honored to help "tell the story of Auburn."**

Signature Events & Community Engagement

For several years now, Auburn's strategic commitment to making our beautiful downtown a destination for our residents, our visitors, our region, and our state (and beyond) has had extraordinary results! The city hosts three annual signature events, a few smaller community events, and in 2022 launched the incredible new pop-up shopping village in Festival Plaza to support local startups and small businesses.



The 4th annual **Riverwalk Blues & Brews Festival** took place in September. 2,500 people attended this 6-hour event, which featured 5 Maine blues bands, 3 local food trucks & 6 area craft breweries.



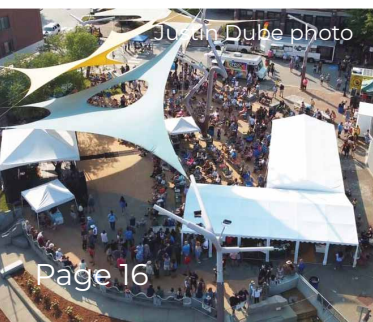

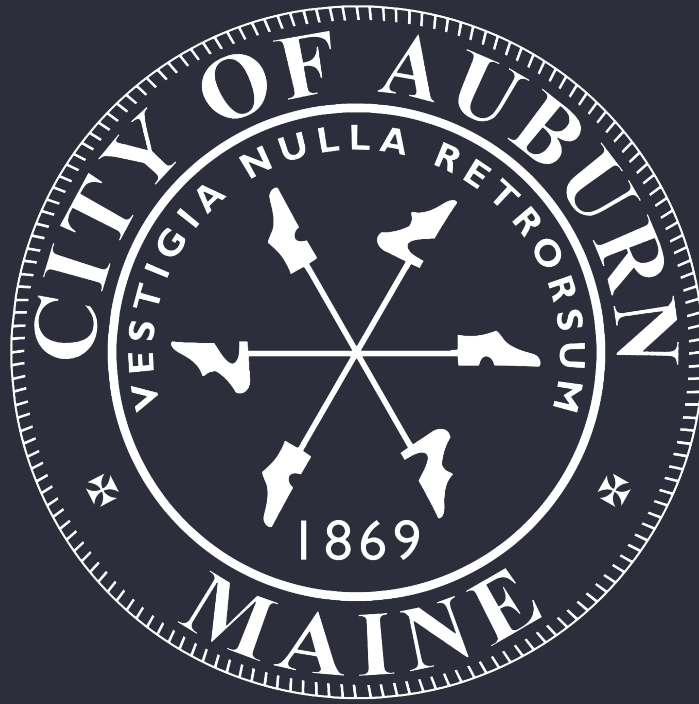
