## **Assessing**

- ➤ The Assessing staff has finished processing the personal property business asset returns received. Approximately 300 businesses did not file returns. This is in comparison to approximately 400 last year. Staff spent one week making telephone calls, sending emails and writing courtesy reminder letters to all non filers. We have received over 50 responses to date. We are more than two weeks ahead of schedule processing the business returns. In order to complete our other projects in preparation for commitment we have set a deadline of June 13th for the completion of personal property.
- This year the Form 706 sent to all commercial rental properties in the city included a section for reporting rents. We are very pleased at the response to the request for the rental data. Rental data is extremely important to update on a regular basis and will be used when establishing value by the Income Approach.
- In preparation for commitment of taxes deeds and declaration of value information up to April 1st is being loaded in the data base. All Homestead and Veteran's Exemption applications received up to April 1st are being reviewed and loaded. And address and name change requests are being processed.
- > We have three commercial appraisals that are presently being reviewed and corresponding inspections will be completed before values are finalized
- ➤ A Board of Assessment Review hearing for the 2015 valuation has been scheduled for Cascades Auburn Fiber for Thursday July 14th at 6pm
- ➤ The current taxable valuation of personal property is \$144,731,400
- ➤ The current taxable valuation of real estate is \$1,840,389,811
- > Total taxable valuation as of June 9, 2016 is 1,985,121,211

## **Auburn Public Library**

- ➤ The 2<sup>nd</sup> annual Spring Online Auction ends at 6 p.m. on Fri., 6/10! Our thanks to all who supported us.
- With school ending we are ready to kick off our annual Summer Reading Program. We are following the nation SRP theme of healthy mind and body. There is something for all ages. Participation is key for students. Research spanning 100 years shows that students typically score lower on standardized tests at the end of summer vacation than they do on the same tests at the beginning of the summer and most students lose about two months of grade level equivalency in mathematical computation skills over the summer months (National Summer Learning Institute). Please check our website for more information about the various programs we will be offering.
- ➤ The Library will be looking to fill two up-coming vacancies in our reference department and in the BookReach program that we share with the Lewiston Public Library.
- ➤ We will be hosting an evaluator for the NASA exhibit on Tues. and Weds., 6/14-15. She will be here to work with staff, observe public interaction with the exhibit, and sit in on the astrophotography presentation.
- ➤ The trustees will hold their regular monthly meeting on Weds., 6/15, at 7:30 a.m.
- The Children's Librarian and the Development Coordinator attended the City Council meeting on Mon., 6/6. The Children's Librarian presented a brief report on the grant that we received from the American Library Association's "Dia" program which is funded by Dollar General. The grant allowed us to purchase a number of Somali-English children's books and to distribute a number of these books in the community. We have also purchased an American Girl-type doll which will be dressed in Somali costuming.
- The Teen Librarian did a presentation on Weds., 6/8, for the Minot schools about our summer reading program and then participated in a panel sponsored by Outright L/A about collaborating with different local agencies.
- ➤ The Library Director attended a two-day meeting in Portsmouth with the other 5 Maine and Mass. pilot libraries in the Maine State Library and Cornerstones of Science STEM resource grant project.

# **Economic and Community Development**

- ➤ Staff is continuing its work on the Northern Borders Regional Commission grant for Phase 1 of the New Auburn Riverway and Greenway Plan, including getting letters of support from key property owners and Maine's elected delegation. The grant is due on June 17<sup>th</sup>.
- ➤ Staff presented the Adaptive Re-use Text Amendment and a Resolution of Support for the Northern Borders Regional Commission grant application at the June 6<sup>th</sup> meeting.
- ➤ Staff conference called the consultants for the New Auburn Riverway and Greenway to strategize moving from the final design stage to the construction document stage.
- ➤ Planning Staff led an in house site plan review for a 7,679 sf mixed use project on Center Street.

- ➤ We attended the Business 2 Business Tradeshow and mad a number of good contacts for existing and potential business opportunities
- Working on a number of potential developments that will hopefully be ready for public announcement soon.

### Fire

- Crews responded to 1 fire call.
- Staff performed a mobile food cart inspection.

- ➤ For the week of June 2<sup>nd</sup> to June 8<sup>th</sup>, we responded to 86 calls for service. These include, but are not limited to: 1 fire call, 65 Emergency Medical calls, 13 Motor Vehicle Accidents 8 with injuries, 3 Hazardous Condition call, and 4 Fire Alarm calls. We received 0 mutual aid responses during this period and we provided 0 mutual aid responses. We provided no Paramedic intercepts during this period, but did have Poland Rescue transport one of our patients as both Rescues were transporting on other calls.

### **Health and Social Services**

- ➤ State GA billing for May expenditures was done this week. We spent \$11,481 in May 2016 compared to \$8,912 in May 2015.
- ➤ We approved 28 unduplicated cases for an average of \$410 each household.
- Three households did 88 hours workfare for a \$704 value.
- Four TANF timed out families were assisted in May.

#### **Human Resources**

➤ Staff attended a Human Resources Conference held at Thomas College in Waterville. Sandra Matheson, Executive Director of the Maine Employees Retirement System was the keynote speaker and discussed the future of the retirement system. Other topics included social media, collective bargaining, good supervisory practices and employment practices to prevent discrimination in the workplace.

Staff from the Maine Municipal Employees Health Trust hosted its annual Administrative Workshop at Auburn Hall for area employers participating in Health Trust Programs.

#### IT

- ➤ GIS staff created a series of map layers and an online map, with clickable layers for use by Economic Development, and participated in a presentation for potential investors. As a follow-up to the presentation, we created four large paper maps of the same area/data.
- ➤ Using maps and images that were obtained by Great Falls TV staff and an outline from Economic Development, GIS staff created a presentation for the B2B trade show in Lewiston. Staff also purchased a TV for Economic Development, and set up the presentation a looped PowerPoint presentation at the Lewiston Colisee on Thursday morning.
- ➤ GIS staff attended a free hands-on workshop at the Esri Portland office covering new online GIS technologies. The workshop introduced several new (free!) options that are included with our current subscription, and will explore the viability of using these in the near future.
- ➤ Staff covered meetings on Monday and Wednesday nights (City Council meeting and Route 4 Report). Also continued work on stock photos for ongoing projects. Staff will also cover the Auburn Adult ED Graduation on Friday, June 10th.

### **Police**

- ➤ The department handled 643 calls for service this week. Officers conducted 222 motor vehicle stops and 16 field interviews. Officers investigated 65 offenses of which, 9 of which were felonies, generating 19 arrests, 23 criminal summonses and 2 juvenile arrests. Officers responded to 34 motor vehicle crashes.
- ➤ Six officers joined twelve Special Olympics Athletes in running the 3.5 miles Auburn Leg from Coleman Collision to the Longley Bridge.
