Assessing

- Staff has been working in the field since September 19th doing the State mandated one in four inspections. State law requires a municipality to do exterior inspections of all the properties in the city, residential & commercial, once every four years. The goal is to inspect one quarter of the City each year. The areas of the city staff is currently working in has been posted on the website, the Police Department has been notified and a map of the streets where staff is currently working, which IT created, will be posted in the main floor lobby and updated with the areas as they are completed. Approximately 500-550 exterior inspections have been completed since September 19th.
- ➤ This past week an *estimated range of* value on a finished project as proposed in the downtown was completed. Per the plans and specifications provided to the Assessing Department the estimated range of value was derived to assist the developer in planning for financing, tax burdens etc.
- > Staff continues to get inquiries from taxpayers concerning the valuation of their properties. Appraisals have been submitted for review and while Katelyn and Joe work on the one in fours I am reviewing the appraisals and doing the inspections in order to assure they are completed in a timely fashion.
- ➤ Reports are being run and data from the 2016 commitment is being used to complete the Municipal Valuation Report. The MVR must be completed each year for the State and includes information such as valuation of real estate, valuation of personal property, information on exemptions, special land use classifications etc. The report is used by the State to prepare statistical summaries and provides information used in the annual State Valuation Report, provide data used to compute reimbursements to municipalities, to track special land use programs in effect across the State etc. A copy of the completed MVR along with pertinent statistical information is distributed each year to all Council Managers, City Clerk, Finance Director, Tax Collector and City Manager.

Auburn Public Library

➤ The Annual meeting was held on Thursday, 9/29. The Trustees, Corporators, and guests were treated to an historical perspective and an introduction to new technology in the Library, including a 3D printer.

- > The building audit from Cordja has been received and is being reviewed. An initial estimate for replacing the carpeting has also been received.
- > The Library Director attended the City's department head meeting on Tuesday, 9/27.
- ➤ The Children's Services Manager attended a meeting of The Lupine Committee which honors the best in children's literature with Maine ties.

- ➤ We Issued the following:

- > To date, we've received 560 requests for absentee ballots for the November election
- > We continue to work on staffing the polling places for the November election. We now have 61 positions filled with several left to fill. We are in need of Republicans to work the P.M. shift and Deputy Registrars who will register voters at the polls
- Prepared and labeled the metal tamper proof boxes we will use for the election
- Registered 23 voters (either new voters or existing voters who have moved to Auburn from another municipality), cancelled 2 voters (deceased), and made 27 voter registration changes (either a change of name, address, or enrollment change)

Economic and Community Development

- > Staff met with members of the Maine Arts Commission to discuss the implementation of the Cultural Plan.

- > Staff worked with foreign investors on property acquisition and zoning issues.
- > Staff continues to review current TIFs for amendments to meet the City Council's goals/directives.
- > Staff is working on providing information for agenda items on the Council's tentative calendar.
- > Staff continues to work with several potential businesses that are considering locating or relocating to Auburn.
- Permits continue to be busy
- ➤ An application has been received for Krispy Kreme at 410 Center Street
- ➤ The City of Lewiston and Brookfield reached agreement on transferring ownership of the canals and the agreement has been modified so the City of Lewiston retains their water rights for recreation or other purposes. The city of Auburns water rights which are shared by contract are not mentioned in the agreement or the recently file FERC Application to remove the canals from Brookfield's license.
- > 741 Broad Street continues to be a problem and is unsafe for the occupancy for which it is being used. Staff will be asking the Council to determine if it is dangerous based on the criteria in State Statute in November.

The buildings found to be dangerous by the Council on Station Road, Newbury Street and Patton Street are being reviewed for hazardous materials estimates and removal. Demolition RFP's will follow in November with Demolitions likely in December. Staff will then attempt to collect reimbursements in the form of a special tax.

Fire

- Crews responded to 3 fire call in Auburn and assisted the Town of Turner with a large fire at an automobile dealership.
- > Staff performed a final C/O inspection, along with several follow up inspections.
- > Staff met with the representative for the owner of the property at 67 Minot Avenue to discuss building security and protection.
- Crews performed a Fire Prevention program for approximately 40 home schooled children of all ages. This was done at the Auburn Public Library.
- > Staff attended a pre-construction meeting with the contractors performing upgrades to Central and E-5 stations.
- > Staff and crew attended a webinar on scheduling software.
- > Crews performed 1 life safety inspection.
- Crews participated in training on Extremity Trauma.
- > Staff continued training to crews on Fire Education for age specific target groups.
- > Crews continued the annual Hose Testing for our compliance with NFPA regulations.
- For the week of September 22nd to September 28th, we responded to 84 calls for service. These include, but are not limited to: 3 fire calls, 58 Emergency Medical calls, 7 Motor Vehicle Accidents 5 with injuries, 1 Hazardous Condition call (Major Gas Leak in New Auburn), 8 Service calls and 6 fire alarm calls. We received 0 mutual aid responses during this period and we provided 1 mutual aid response to the Town of Turner for their Structure Fire. We provided 0 Paramedic intercepts during this time period.

IT

- ➤ This week GFTV worked on file prep and scheduling for the month of October. Staff also began the process of preparing materials for Intro To Video classes for the Spring semester. Hopefully we will have some dedicated space to do that come Spring time. Staff also spent time looking for some web related resources for enhancing knowledge and skills in production and editing. Staff watched online tutorials on editing with the new edition of software that we use.
- New software means new tools and changes in graphic interface layout that we need to adjust to in day to day operations. Staff also assisted city staff in audio visual set up for classes here at Auburn Hall.
- GIS Staff attended the Maine GIS User Group fall meeting and presented a workshop "Tips for Creating Useful Online Maps and Apps (without burning through credits or driving yourself mad in the process). " During the business meeting, the group chair cited Auburn as an example of Municipal / School collaboration on community based projects.

Working with the Planning Department, staff used GIS to create a summary worksheet for Ag zone statistics. The worksheet was used in a planning meeting for planning discussions for a future AG Zone study.

Police

- ➤ The department handled 640 calls for service this week.
- Officers conducted 196 motor vehicle stops and 15 field interviews.
- Officers investigated 98 offenses of which, 7 of which were felonies, generating 28 arrests, 35 criminal summonses and 11 juvenile arrests.
- > Officers responded to 30 motor vehicle crashes.

- > Crews assisted Recreation in moving items around in preparation for a small renovation
- Crews continue to work litter patrol around the City as well on Washington St. prior to mowing
- Crews were even busier in last minute preparations for the T.D. Tree Grant planting.
- Crews were busy in preparation for the Dempsey Challenge, street sweeping, trash patrol, minor patching on the route(s), Graffiti removal
- > Fall grading has begun in preparation for winter.
- > Tree work has been done on Granite St, Meadow Lane, Dell Court, Cleveland Av.
- Basin cleaning and inspection continues on 13, 21, 10 and 11's runs
- Crews installed chips at the playgrounds as well as hauling some for the Community Garden.
- ➤ District inspections continue prior to winter to review any issues foreseen prior to plowing, objects in the R.O.W., lifted basin and or water gates, curb issues, old mail boxes, broken pavement etc.

- Fall Youth Football practices are in full swing and games this weekend are home at Walton Field. We currently have: 1-2 grades Flag Football (10 signed up) 3-4 grade (27 signed up) 5-6 grade (34 signed up), and 7-8 grade (54 signed up).
- Senior Walking happens every Tues/Thurs in the Ingersoll Turf Facility from 9am-10am.
- ➤ Line Dance drop-in running Sept 9 Dec 16 on Fridays, two class times being offered 1030-1130am or 6-7pm. Cost is \$3 drop-in at the Hasty Side Room.
- ➤ Afterschool Open Gym running Sept 8 Dec 19 on Mon/Thurs/Fri from 230-4pm for grades 5-12 at the Hasty Gym for \$1 each day.
- Fall Soccer with Seacoast United Soccer running Sept 10-Oct 15 on Saturdays for ages 3-16, we have 22 signed up for ages 3-4, 27 for ages 5-6, and 31 for ages 7-12.
- ➤ Pickelball drop-in— every Tues/Thurs from 9am-11am, \$2 for residents \$3 for non-residents. Beginners are welcomed, we have 3 courts running and average around 15-25 per day.
